With the vision to impart education to rural masses, Hon'ble Founder President Yashwantrao Gadakh founded Mula Education Society, Sonai in 1979. The society runs varied 45 branches including schools, higher secondary schools, traditional and professional colleges educating around 22,000 rural students.

Newasa taluka in Ahmednagar District is a drought prone area. Most of the pupils belong to the families of marginal farmers. The Mula Education Society, Sonai is a premier institute catering to the needs of the rural masses. While disseminating education among the rural masses, the MES also justifies its role for social cause by arranging community oriented programmes like eye donation, adoption of girls for education, scheme of adopted villages, beautification of the Kautiki River and many more in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan, Sonai*.

Aiming at dissemination of higher education to the rural masses, Hon'ble Yashwantrao Gadakh Patil envisaged the college. The college was established in 1989. Today the college is heading forward under the competent academic leadership of Prashant Patil Gadakh, President of MES, Sonai. In the course of last 25 years, the college has become fully fledged institution with varied academic dimensions. At present the college runs 5 UG and 6 PG programmes viz. B.A., B.Com. B.Sc., B.B.A., B.B.A. (Computer Application), M.A., (English), M.A. (Hindi), M.A. (History), M.Com. M.Sc. (Organic and Analytical Chem.) and M.B.A. The college has started job-oriented courses like B.B.A. and B.B.A. (Computer Application) to outreach the educationally deprived class of the society, varied courses of Yashwantrao Chavan Open University are run. Preface

The college undertook NAAC Accreditation in 2003 and secured C⁺⁺ grade. The college again volunteered NAAC Reaccreditation in 2011and obtained 'B' grade with the CGPA of 2.44. The college is now in the third phase of assessment and accreditation awaited in the year 2016-17 and endeavoring for the best grade. Teaching and Non-teaching faculty of the college are pursuing degrees, research and skills based programme to update their knowledge, as a measure of quality improvement.

Every year the college undertakes various activities to enrich the academics of the students such as Expert Lecture Series, Career Oriented Courses, Audio Visual Classes with LCD Projector, *Late Smt. Taisaheb Kadam* Debating Competition and many more.

Apart from the academic programmes, the college very much believes in the versatile development of students. The college has set up hostel accommodation for boys and girls separately with boarding, canteen, provisional store etc. Spacious playground awaits the sportsmen. Computer Center runs Computer courses, provides Internet and updates IT outlook of the students. The college has proposed skill oriented courses like Soil and Water Analysis and Beauty Culture and has focused on student's placement in the industry. As one of the ICT initiatives, the college has launched Online Admissions from this academic year.

We believe that personality development of students is an amalgamation of academic quality and facilities with wholehearted co-operation on the part of the students and parents as well. We are sure greenery of palm and mango trees in the college campus shall contribute delight to enhance the personality of the students.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY AND SWOC ANALYSIS

1. Curricular Aspects

- Keeping in view with the quality policy, the college has traditional, professional and career oriented courses / programmes with wide range of options at UG and PG levels in Arts, Commerce and Science Faculty. The programmes have been implemented in order to achieve the goals of the college.
- The college follows the norms and regulations of the State Government with regard to admission policies.
- The college is affiliated to SPP University, Pune and follows its norms with regard to curriculum, academic calendar and evaluation process. The college has gained permanent affiliation to all UG and PG courses except one.
- The syllabus structure for each course has been devised by the university. The teachers of the college participate in the restructuring of the syllabus as members / chairpersons of the board of studies. The teachers of the college participate in the workshops on the restructuring of the syllabi. The college has also organized workshop on the restructuring of the syllabus in commerce.
- Taking cognizance of the demands in markets, the college has applied to vocational courses. The college is running career-oriented courses viz. Photography, Medicinal and Aromatic Plants, Beauty Culture Course and e-commerce.
- The college at present offers 6 UG programmes in Arts, 3 UG programmes in Commerce and 3 UG programmes in Science along with 3 PG programmes in Arts, 1 PG programmes in Commerce and 2 PG programmes in Science, Ph.D in Commerce, besides MBA of YCMOU, Nasik through distance mode.
- There are 7 subjects available at F.Y.B.A. level. A student has to select any 5 subjects with English as compulsory subject. At S.Y.B.A., a student has to select one subject at special level (consisting of 3 papers) along with 2 subjects at general levels amongst the subjects studied at F.Y.B.A. besides 1 English Compulsory paper. At T.Y.B.A., the same subjects are offered.
- There are 7 subjects available at F.Y.B.Com. level with internal option to Marketing and Salesmanship / Business Environment and Entrepreneurship. At S.Y.B.Com., students have to select 5 subjects along with one special subject from Indian Banking System and Marketing Management. At T.Y.B.Com., students have to select four subjects and two papers at special level.
- There are two groups available at F.Y.B.Sc. The students have to opt four subjects as group A or group B. There shall be two theory papers and one practical paper for each subject. Any three subjects offered at the

F.Y.B.Sc. level, are to be offered at S.Y.B.Sc. along with one language Marathi or English. Environmental Awareness is compulsory subject for S.Y.B.A. / S.Y.B.Com./ S.Y.B.Sc. At T.Y.B.Sc. students can offer Botany, Chemistry or Physics at Special level. There are 6 theory papers and 3 practical courses.

- For B.B.A. and B.B.A. (C.A.), there are six semesters in all having six papers each in a semester.
- The revised syllabus of Choice Based Credit System is functional for M.A., M.Com. and M.Sc. courses.
- All records of teaching and academic events are maintained as per the prescribed formats of ISO 9001: 2008 parameters and are audited at the end of each semester.
- Traditional method of lecture is supplemented with ICT to make the teaching process effective.
- With the quest of continual development, the college volunteered for AAA
 (Academic and Administrative Audit) by the SPP University, Pune for the
 Best College Award.

2. Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

- The admission process of the college is partially online. It is completed in accordance with SPP University, Pune and Government of Maharastra as far as reservation policy and intake. Wide publicity of detailed notifications of admission programme is made through the website and in the local newspapers. The Prospectus of the college is also made available on college website so that students can get easy access to the admission process. scholarships, freeships, curricular. co-curricular extracurricular activities. Admissions to the courses are made on merit basis. Yashwant Samajik Pratishthan, Sonai adopted economically weaker girls students and orphan girl students to support them during their academic tenure. The college allows poor students to pay their tuition fees in installments.
- The college has applied different measures to make education student centric:
 - The college attempts to bridge the gap between students through the Remedial Coaching. Considering the local needs, the college at present 8 Career Oriented Courses to develop the vocational skills of the students.
 - ii. To enrich the knowledge of the students, the college organizes guest lectures, students' seminars, projects, and special permission for the PG degree students to have open access into the stack and periodical sections of the library.
 - iii. The college adheres to the policy of coeducation to encourage healthy academic interaction between boys and girls. The boys and girls participate together in all extracurricular and co-curricular programmes.

- iv. Such students who face the risk of being dropped out are identified. The faculty members directly discuss with such students and try to guide them out of their difficulties.
- v. Some students are slow learners and experience difficulties in studies due to their inability to cope with the college environment. Slow learners are given special support by the teachers by taking time with them especially through accompaniment and emotional support.
- vi. Students are encouraged to participate in classroom activities and lecture method is supplemented by demonstration method, field visits, role playing method, slogan, poster and paper presentation method, surveys and the use of ICT.
- Keeping a view to provide the quality education to the students; 20 teachers out of 32 granted teachers have gained Ph.D. degree. Total 5 non granted teachers are SET/ NET qualified.
- The college has started Yashwant Study Club in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* to enable the student to acquire competitive skills and to face the challenges of competitive exams. The principal of the college is the Ex-officio Director of Yashwant Study Club.
- The learning experiences of the students of the college are enriched through arranging different co-curricular activities and sharing the responsibility of its arrangements. The emphasis has been laid on developing the overall personality of students through activities like Soft Skill Development Programmes, seminar presentations, participation of students in research activities and research competition like *Avishkar*.
- Evaluation is a major device for segregating the students into the classes as advanced, average and slow learners. The college strictly adheres to the SPP University's rules and regulation and accordingly follows annual, semester and choice based credit system to different courses. Broadly, evaluation can be divided as internal and external. Continuous comprehensive internal evaluation system offers the subject teacher at a glance, the students' performance. The teachers have modified their teaching and or developed teaching techniques for the advanced, average and slow learners.
- The college has taken initiatives in order to make teaching ICT enabled and the management is also constructive in availing the required infrastructure.

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

• In order to foster the research attitude among the students and the faculty, the college has constituted a Research Coordination Committee. Because of its recommendations, so far 24 Minor Research Projects with the sanctioned outlay of Rs. 27,80,000 and 2 Major research Projects with the sanctioned outlay of Rs. 19,76,100 have been carried out and 15 National and State Level Conferences / Seminars have been organized. Total 58 students have participated in the Avishkar Research Zonal Competition

- arranged by SPP University, Pune. Total 6 students have participated at University level Avishkar Research Competition.
- Total 21 teachers have gained Ph.D. Degree and 15 teachers have completed M.Phil. Degree and 16 teachers have registered for Ph.D. Degree. Total 9 teachers are the recognized research guides of Universities. Total 3 candidates have completed their Ph.D. and 13 candidates have registered for Ph.D. Total 7 teachers have been awarded at international, national and state level.
- The college has made the proposals for research centre in English.
- Total 66 eminent personalities, including VC, Director and Jt. Director of Dept. of Higher Education of Govt. of Maharastra, Deans of Universities, noted industrialists have visited and guided the college.
- Total 278 research papers have been published in International and National peer reviewed Journals. Important details as follows:

 - Total Impact factor of research paper: 133.671
 - Total research paper in Scopus: 07
- Total 196 research papers have been presented in International and National conferences/ workshops/ seminars.
- Total 16 teachers have presented their research papers overseas in the countries like Sri Lanka, South Korea, Nepal and Thailand and availed Sabbatical Leave. The management has availed the research fund of Rs. 1 lac per year for pursuing research. Overseas presenters have benefitted through the fund.
- The college has a conducive and satisfactory system to ensure optimal use of research facilities and resources available in college for research.
- The teachers provide academic counselling to students. The college has appointed a psychiatrist for personal consultancy.
- Research findings, whether reports, market information and religious guidance to non-Marathi pilgrims at Shani Shingnapur are shared amongst the college and the community around.
- A number of extension drives have been arranged in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan viz.* eye donation, cleaning and beautification of Kautiki River, adoption of Village *Morye Chinchore*, pledge of simple marriages, a visit to SPP University, Pune, and *Mahila Bachat Gat*.
- In order to increase the sense of social responsibility many extension programmes like Blood donation, Blood group checking and Hemoglobin testing camps are organized by NSS and NCC.
- The college has formed MoU's with industries, firms, Credit Cooperative Societies, Banks and Educational Institutes in order to develop academic and research activities through collaboration.

4.Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college campus has planned quite significantly that, there is enough open space with landscaped master plan, greenery, playground and fully ventilated (cross ventilation) spacious classrooms and departments to accommodate students. The college has 24 fully-ventilated spacious classrooms, 16 equipped laboratories and 6 departments with cabin in Academic building 1, Academic building 2, and Academic building 3, with basic amenities.
- In order to create and enhance the infrastructural facilitates for effective teaching and learning, the policy is framed according to the strength of students in different streams.
- The college has clearly marked space for the common facilities available on the campus. These facilities include IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell), Health center, Canteen, Seminar Hall, Gymkhana, NSS and NCC. For other units like Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counseling and Career Guidance cell, Placement Unit, safe drinking water facility, and provision of auditorium, etc. The spaces within the college campus are shared.
- A spacious 2-acre playground is available for outdoor games i.e. cricket, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, etc. in college campus. The college students have a free access to games like hockey, athletics and swimming.
- The Infrastructure is augmented with well-equipped seminar hall, Chemistry laboratory, Physics laboratory, two wheeler parking, four wheeler parking, office automation, Library services automation, Building elevation, Fencing, *Vidnyan Bhavan*, CCTV Camera, Running tracks 200 mtr., Running tracks 400 mtr., Drinking water and vriddhi software.
- The examination arrangement of differently abled students is done at the ground-floor. The college has made a Ramp at the entrance of the Academic building.
- Faculty members are provided with computers with internet browsing facility for preparation of teaching / learning materials in their respective departments. In addition, Multimedia, LCD projectors, Public addressing system, OHPs are available for the faculty use.
- The college avails of National Knowledge Network connectivity through the facility of INFLIBNET (N-list Programme) which is provided in the college library.
- The college has clear mentioned places for the sensitive equipment like electricity generators, water purifiers, chemicals and scientific instruments.
- The college campus is enriched by green vegetation with various kinds of trees and herbs, spacious ground and greenery. Students can study in mango and chikku orchard near the college campus.

5.Student Support and Progression

- The college publishes online updated prospectus for the U.G. and P.G. students every academic year.
- The percentage of students receiving financial assistance from state and central government is between 80% to 90%.
- Different types of scholarships / freeships are provided to the reserved category students and students belonging to weaker section of society.
- Earn and learn scheme is a major source of financial help for the needy students. The college contributes the share more than 25% along with university share to the scheme.
- The students have participated in state, national and international sports competition.
- The college has provided medical help to the students through group insurance and on its own.
- The UGC sponsored Remedial Coaching Scheme was introduced for slow learners from SC, ST, OBC and minority category students.
- For EDP, the college has invited noted entrepreneurs and industrialists resulting into starting of various enterprises.
- Total 35 students of the college have obtained success in competitive examination.
- Two students bagged the first Prize 11 times and won the cash prizes mounting to Rs. 46,250 by participating in 43 State Level Elocution and Debating Competitions in academic year 2015-16.

6.Governance, Leadership and Management

- The college is governed by the Mula Education Society, Sonai. Local Managing Committee provides the roadmap to accomplish long and short goals of the college.
- IQAC provides facilitative and participative voluntary system for the sustenance of quality and enhancement measures.
- Principal, as the academic leader of the college, steers all the academic ambience of the college.
- Vice-principal, Faculty in-charge and head of the departments are invested with appropriate powers.
- Through distribution of powers, works and responsibilities, faculty is actively but voluntarily involved in curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Students, parents and alumni support the administration and management through their active participation and foreseeable feedback.
- The IQAC ensures quality policy, initiatives, measures, standards and implementation through the participation and feedback of all stakeholders.

7.Innovations and Best Practices

- The college has established varied best practices in curricular and extracurricular activities.
- The college has reflected the true colors of the community around through its activities.

Best Practice - I: ORGANISATION OF WORKSHOPS FOR TEACHERS AND ADMINS OF THE SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES IN THE VICINITY

Usually education of student is moderately divided into three stages viz. 1 std. to 10th std. (primary/secondary education), 11 std. to 12 std. (higher secondary education) and 12std. onwards higher education. A few subjects like English, Marathi, Science, etc. are taught at all the three levels. However, it has been observed that one of the reasons of failure in these subjects is due to gap of communication among the teachers who taught at these different levels. Workshops are arranged by the Govt. or regulatory bodies for the teachers at these stages separately, where the teachers of the three stages cannot exchange their ideas under one roof. The meetings of the departments were convened to discuss and earmark difficult topics in the subject. The report of the meeting was submitted to the Principal of the college for the approval for arranging the workshops. Timetable and the schedule were chalked out by taking into consideration other programmes of the college. A Two Day Workshop on 'English Grammar and Pronunciation for Primary and Secondary Teachers' was organized during 11-12 Jan. 2016. A Two Day Workshop on 'Vyakaran V Vyavharik Upyojit Marathi' (Grammar and Applied Marathi) was organised during 15 – 16 Feb. 2016 for the secondary teachers of the schools of Mula Education Society, Sonai. Workshop on 'Empowerment of office' for teaching and non-teaching staff was organised by IQAC on 18 Mar. 2016.

Best Practice II: STUDENT AND FACULTY EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

The College is fortunate to share the topics and the units of syllabus with Agriculture College, Sonai and College of Education, Sonai especially with respect to subjects like Botany, Mathematics, Chemistry, English, History and Geography. Other three colleges offer professional courses and the host college offers traditional courses. The College formed MoU's with Agriculture College, Sonai and College of Education, Sonai. 8 teachers of ACSC, Sonai, 3 teachers of College of Agriculture, Sonai and 4 teachers of College of Education, Sonai participated in the faculty exchange programme and taught at the exchanged college. The students of the colleges were also exchanged. The idea of exchanged faculty members and students so stirred the whole

teaching ambience of the college that students started attending the classes seriously and participated in the teaching activity whole heartedly.

Mission

We, at Mula Education Society's Arts, Commerce and Science College, Sonai are committed to impart education to under graduate and post graduate students as per the needs of stakeholders.

We shall continually improve the quality of teaching, self-evolution and accountability of our institutes towards society. We shall strive for overall development of student through value based education, so that our students will be appreciated as model citizens, who will make nation to lead the world.

The goals and objectives of the college are:

- a) Provide inclusive education by making it accessible to all sections of society
- b) Sensitize and engage students in issues of gender equality, human rights and ecology in order to make them socially responsible
- c) To aim at overall personality development through extracurricular activities.
- d) To attain community and social development through various activities.
- e) To provide a platform to the students to enhance their skills/potentials as well as a sense of social responsibility and nationality through sports, cultural activities, NCC, NSS, etc.
- f) To train and coach the students to face competitive examinations.
- g) To help the students for on-the-job training and placements.

Our Vision, Mission and Objectives are always communicated to students, teachers and other stakeholders through every programme in the college.

The vision, mission and objectives of the college are displayed in departments and other prominent locations in the college campus. At the beginning of the academic year, the information about the college and its ideals are also communicated to newly admitted students through orientation programme (s)/ Principal's address. The vision, mission and the objectives of the institution are also communicated to parents, students and stakeholders through college website.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example (s).

As the college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune, the college follows the University-prescribed curriculum. The University prepares an Academic Calendar that specifies the duration of the semester, the date of commencement and the end of Semesters. The Academic and Activity calendar is prepared by each department to ensure effective implementation. Different stages in the process of implementation of the curriculum are as follows:

- a. Stage I: A meeting is held in each department with principal towards the end of the academic year to do the course-distribution and other activities for the next year. Based on the expertise of individual teachers, the syllabus is allotted to them by the Head of the Department. Discussions are held on the methodologies, these are followed to orient new teachers on different approaches to the curriculum.
- b. Stage II: All departments prepare a pre time-table to check the feasibility of delivering the allotted curriculum by calculating the number of lectures/ practical available in each term.
- c. Stage III: Teachers are then required to submit a teaching plan based on the number of days required for effective teaching of the syllabus, as also the number of days required for conduct of examinations.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The University revises its course curricula after every five years. Generally syllabi restructuring

Workshops are held at district level for deliberations. The workshops are attended by concern teachers to address their views. The revised curricula are made available to all on university website and are also communicated to the college through circular letters.

Our college faculties receive all the needed support for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices, they are as follows:

- a. To translate the curriculum effectively, teachers are provided with syllabi, academic calendar, and are encouraged to use various teaching aids. Whenever syllabus is revised, the concerned faculties of the subjects are deputed to attend the workshops. The separate budgetary provision is made to encourage teacher to participate in seminars, conferences and workshops.
- b. The college deputes the faculties for the Faculty Improvement Programmes and Quality Improvement Programmes conducted by the university and other institutions and agencies. The faculties deputed attend Orientation/Refresher courses.
- c. The college also organizes seminars, conferences, workshops for the benefit of the teachers and students.
- d. The faculties are also encouraged to publish articles in journals of national and international repute.
- e. The college provides library and e-learning facilities (INFLIBNET) to the faculties to effectively deliver the curriculum.
- f. The college undertakes up gradation of laboratories from time to time.
- g. Students' feedback on teachers' performance and curriculum is collected to make teaching-learning more effective. The Principal gives necessary instructions to the individual teacher after analysis of the feedback, and a letter of appreciation is given to a teacher showing good performance.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university or other statutory agency.

Some of our teachers actively participate in framing the curriculum, in their capacity as members of the Board of Studies for different subjects. As stated earlier, others participate in workshops at the developmental stage or in training workshops that are conducted after the designing of the curriculum.

The institution aids in every way to upgrade the infrastructure and procure resources for effective delivery of the curriculum. Besides, teachers provide a host of additional resources while taking students beyond the curriculum. Following are some major initiatives taken for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university:

- Distribution of teaching assignments and planning of guest and peer lectures.
- Planning for periodic evaluation in the form of tests, seminars and home assignments, informing the students academic planning for the year, practical work for Science students. Planning field visits, industrial visits, survey and educational excursions.
- The college provides computer and internet facility to each and every department.
- University syllabus and question papers are available in library as soft copies. The college has e-library and ICT facility.

They play the leading role in restructuring under graduate and postgraduate curricula of said subjects of Savitribai Phule Pune University. Number of

other faculties participated in different workshops of syllabus framing and gave valuable suggestions. Some of the suggestions given by these faculty members were considered and accepted with little modification.

- The IQA Cell and faculty members of chemistry department jointly developed and designed a one month job-oriented Certificate in Soil and Water Analysis.
- The Department of Botany designed and developed a need-based Certificate Course in Medicinal and Aromatic Plants. This one year course is accepted as it is and funded by UGC.
- College through feedback committee periodically takes the feedback of the students and staff on the present syllabus.

The college conducts 8 different interdisciplinary local need-based and job oriented certificate courses for the students. The syllabi are designed with a view to boost employability of the students. These certificate courses are of 1 to 12 months duration.

- 2.Beauty Culture (Dept. of Marathi since 2012-13)
- 3. Medicinal and Aromatic Plant (Dept. of Botany since 2013-14)

 - 1. Digital Photography and Video Shooting (Dept. of Physics-since 2015-16)
 - 2.e- Commerce (Dept. of Commerce since 2014-15)
 - 3. Spoken English (Dept. of English since 2015-16)
 - 4. Certificate Course in C Programming (Dept. of Physics since 2015-16)
- MPSC Foundation Course in collaboration with Yashwant Study Clubsince 2015-16. In addition, the college runs Soft Skill Development Programme and various co-curricular activities for overall development of students.

The curriculum of all these certificate courses have been designed by college faculty after taking into consideration the local needs of the students.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The institution strives to achieve the stated objectives by supplementing the University Syllabi with enrichment courses for the holistic development of the students.

Whether the objectives are being achieved or not is monitored by:

• Periodic evaluations by conducting tests, oral examinations, class-room interactions and analysis of the examination result. Results are used as

tools for determining whether the students are responding or not to the aims and objectives of the curriculum.

- Feedback from the Peers, Guest and Visiting faculty as well as employers is also used for ensuring the achievement of course objectives.
- An informal feedback is also taken periodically by interacting with students within and outside the classrooms.

1.2 Academic Flexibility:

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

• Goals and objectives of the courses:

- i. To give an impetus to economic development through inculcating need-based skills among the students.
- ii. To boost employability and develop entrepreneurship qualities.
- iii. To impart knowledge that will help the students in their family professions.

• Utility:

Certificate courses like 'Beauty Culture' and 'Soil and Water Analysis' designed by the college become a source of self employment for students after its completion. Courses are implemented from 2009-10 as per the approval of University.

The Certificate course in Medicinal and Aromatic Plant is designed by taking into consideration the local needs of the stakeholders and that of the environment conservation. Other certificate courses are need based to cater to the need of students in agriculture profession with a view to promote scientific temperament. MPSC Foundation course prepares the rural students to compete with their urban counter parts. Spoken English course prepares the students for English conversation.

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

The College does not offer dual degree programmes. As per SPP University of Pune norms, no student can concurrently take admission for two degree programmes.

However, the college is one of the centers of YCMOU, Nashik, and it provides facility for doing UG and PG courses simultanesouly.

Any graduate can pursue postgraduate degree in Arts in the 3 available specializations in the college. Science students have adequate number of options available at second year to judge their interest for specialization at final year. This provides opportunity for lateral mobility.

The graduate student with Chemistry subject can opt Organic or Analytical Chemistry subject at PG level.

In Commerce stream, the students have sufficient options to pursue degree and post graduate degree in the chosen subject. Arts students can opt for their final degree core subject at the second year. However, they can change their special subject at the third year also by passing two equivalent optional courses of the second year at the third year examination.

• Enrichment courses:

The college has made available four add-on courses at nominal fees for dissemination of knowledge that are not included in the syllabi. These

courses involve practical exposure through field visits, lab work and peer lectures. The details are elaborated under 1.2.5. PG courses are having credit system. The students from 12th Science can take admission to Art, Commerce, B.B.A., B.B.A. (C.A.) or B.Sc. programmes .Students of D.Ed, B.Ed, and Engineering Diploma can take admission by changing the streams.

• Admissions:

The eligibility for admissions to these undergraduate and post graduate degree courses are as per University norms. The number of maximum intake of students is as per the University directives. • Curriculum:

For all the affiliated courses the curriculum is recommended by the University. The College has framed its own syllabi for the enrichment programmes.

• Fee Structure:

For all degree programmes the fee structure is as per the University norms and Government of Maharashtra directives. For the certificate courses, the fee is decided by the LMC.

• Faculty Qualifications:

The basic qualification of UG and PG faculty position is set by UGC, Govt. of Maharashtra and SPP University, Pune. The college follows the same.

• Salary:

The college staff is remunerated for additional courses as per the directives of the University. Visiting faculty is paid as per the norms of the University/ UGC.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institutions goals and objectives are integrated?

The faculty members take every possible effort to supplement the University curriculum to fulfill the local needs of the students and allow the institution to achieve the objectives stated in its vision and mission statement. Academic programmes are integrated with practical and field trainings. The college has developed linkages with 19 institutions/industries in and around

Sonai. Students get exposure to the issues in their respective fields, for instance, Science students get opportunities to undergo on-plant training and visit industries, institutions of higher education and research. They also participate in research projects competition (AVISHKAR), attend lectures of eminent scientists and academicians and participate in interactive learning. Commerce and Arts students get opportunity to undergo practical orientation at banks, institutions and through filed visits. All students have opportunity to participate in various social, cultural and extension activities. The college has made available such 6 different interdisciplinary job-oriented certificate programmes that help in integrating the academic knowledge with market demands and socio-economic needs. The college organizes visits to Mula Sugar Factory, Credit Societies, Mauli Food Product and MIDC for improving the practical knowledge of students.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The college faculty makes a sincere effort to restructure and enrich the syllabi of certificate courses for giving an impetus to capacity building among students and boosting their employability. There is a special batch of students working on competitive examination. Visits are arranged to industry, financial institutions, Universities, natural sights, etc.

Feedback from different stakeholders helps to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market as follows:

• Feedback from Students:

The college collects feedback from students on the 'overall teaching and learning programme' in the first semester / term of academic year. The feedback has fifteen probes. Students respond for the probes on the course content they attended. The analysis of the feedback gives an idea as to applicability of the course content and to contemporary needs. Besides, identifying lacunae, the concerned teachers also interact with the students. The information so obtained is communicated to the concerned members.

• Feedback from Alumni:

The college conducts yearly alumni meet. The past students are vital source of feedback on the current trends and in job-oriented skills required for the students.

The feedback from alumni is always instrumental for starting new degree and certificate programmes in the college.

• Feedback from Employers:

The college has linkages with some of the industries, financial institutions, banks and business establishments. Pharmaceuticals and Forbes are regular recruiters of our students. The college also conducts capabilities of the

students. This also provides a tool to assess the holistic evaluation of the curriculum.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The college has always held high the issues of environment and human values. In its effort to sensitize the students on the social issues like gender equality, environment and human rights, the faculty has shown keen interests in suggesting to incorporate these issues in syllabi at University and college level.

1. Environmental Awarness:

Environmental Awareness course is compulsory at the second year for all students in Arts, Commerce and Science. The college has channelized the youth energy by participation of students in projects like tree-plantation, rain water harvesting, composting of organic waste, reuse of water, recycle of waste and minimizing use of non biodegradable waste. The college also conducts vermi composting project to promote students' awareness in habitat and ecosystem conservation. The college conducts Green Audit every year. Students are acquainted with flora and fauna available in the college campus. The college also organizes social activity such as Cleaning of Kautuki River, participation in Sonai Youth Festival (Navratri Mahosthav) and Disaster Management workshop.

2.Human Rights and Cyber security:

Human Rights and Cyber security courses are compulsory for PG students. The Principal and the faculty to their credit have a series of activities for students' welfare introduced as special schemes by the University. The college has organized a series of lectures of eminent personalities and government officers to promote awareness on Human Rights. The college has organised lectures on prohibition of ragging and related practices. The college has a committee for the Welfare of Backward Class and Minority Students. The committee works for socio-economic welfare of underprivileged students.

3.Gender:

The college has initiated the following efforts to integrate issues of gender into the curriculum:

- Lectures on Women Empowerment, legal rights of women, rights against sexual harassment through NSS, Students Welfare Dept. and Vidhyarthini Munch.
- Promotion of self-help saving groups, participation of women in governance at grass root level and awareness against female foeticide.
- Organizing lectures of lawyers and judges on awareness against human trafficking and narcotics.

• Implementing Nirbhaya Kanya Abhiyan, a drive to promote girl students for self-defense.

4.Right to Information:

The college has an active cell under the provisions of Right to Information Act. There is special committee formed by the college on this issue and the principal is a chairperson of the committee.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students? Moral and ethical values, employable and life skills, better career options, community orientation Value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students:

• Moral and Ethical Values:

The college does not have exclusive programme on moral and ethical values, but moral and ethical values are imbibed among the students through fruitful discussions in the classrooms and through different programmes like birth and death anniversaries of scientists and national leaders where the platform is made available to the students to voice their views on cultural, moral and ethical issues.

• Employability and Life Skills:

The college has made available 6 interdisciplinary certificate courses. The certificate courses have been designed for all round development of the students and serve values and life skills. All the certificate courses are designed to give an impetus to employability and entrepreneurship development. The courses are designed after giving due consideration to local needs. Certificate courses like soil and water analysis, medicinal and aromatic plants and beauty culture are implemented for the benefit of students in their family profession. A vast majority of our students come from agriculture background. Students can also set up their own business after completing these courses.

• Better Career Options:

Certificate courses like Soil and Water Analysis and Beauty Culture provides new opportunities to students for career development.

• Community Orientation:

Soil and Water Analysis certificate course has largely helped to orient the students to adopt the scientific agriculture techniques. The Photography course gives the idea about video shooting and mixing of the photo. The college organizes heath checkup camp for girls. H.B.P. Bhanudas Maharaj Borude and Prajapita Bramha Kumari Usha didi delivered lectures on value and moral education to students.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

• Feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum:

In Alumni meet held on January 27, 2014, the past students of the Chemistry Department had suggested industry oriented training to Chemistry students for better employability. Same suggestion was also received from works manager of Sun Pharmaceuticals who along with his colleagues had visited this college for campus selection.

In a Parents meet held on January14, 2014, suggestion came for initiating some additional training to students in Agriculture, as agriculture is the main profession of majority of students.

• Certificate Courses:

The college conducts 6 certificate courses. All the certificate courses are for skill development. These certificate courses introduced after a series of interactions with the students, parents, management and the industries.

On demands of students, Marathi, Hindi and English departments held the workshops time to time. Hindi Department organized the Devanagari lipi training Programme, The Marathi department organized Practical Marathi and English department organized the workshop on English Grammar and Pronunciation. Geography department organized two day GPS training programme for students. The department of Commerce arranged the 'Murghas' training workshop. Physics department organizesed Photography Course, Department of Zoology gave training on Vermi composting and Department of Botany organized flori-culture workshop for students.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

Each individual certificate course is monitored for its progress and implementation by the course coordinator. The course coordinator is the overall in-charge for conduct of classes and arranging lectures of visiting faculty. The coordinator is also responsible for organizing practical, field visits and industrial visits. The enrichment programmes are monitored for their implementation in true spirit with proactive participation of faculty, periodic tests, evaluation and interactions with the students during the field visits, performance of the students in classrooms and laboratories, response of students in tests and examinations, interactions with the visiting faculty. The Department of Chemistry organized the excursion on 12th to 16th January 2016 to Pune and Kokan. The Departments of Chemistry and Physics organized the industrial visits in February 2016 to Mula Cooperative Sugar Factory and fermentation industry, Sonai.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The college faculty has contributed significantly to the design and development of curricula for English and Commerce programmes. This is well evident from the following facts:

- 1. The representation of faculty on the Board of Studies of SPP University, Pune is explained in section 1.1.6 above.
- 2. The Dept. of Commerce organized a syllabus framing workshop for the courses of T.Y.B.Com.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

• Feedback from Students on Curriculum:

Feedback on course content and its applications are collected from students at the beginning of the year. Responses on the applicability of the courses are collected from the students by the IQAC. The cell then analyzes the feedback to find out students complaints and suggestions. The findings are then communicated to the Board of Studies.

• Curriculum enrichment:

Topics that need to be covered in the syllabi but otherwise left out by the University are communicated to students through lecture series organized under faculty associations. This helps students in acquiring in-depth knowledge.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

The College introduced the following programmes during last four years.

• M.Sc. (Analytical Chemistry):

Compared to other colleges in the vicinity, the college has a significantly large number of students at the B.Sc. (Chemistry) level. Taking the cognizance this programme was introduced in the academic year 2012-13 to make available better career options and to open up career in research for rural students.

• Courses:

The college initiated three different interdisciplinary short-term need-based certificate programmes for skill development and greater employability.

The college is affiliated to SPP University, Pune and follows the syllabus framed by the University. However, the college faculty is involved in curriculum design. The following are the achievements in curriculum design, implementation and providing enrichment courses.

- The IQAC and the Department of Botany jointly designed and drafted a one year 'Certificate in Medicinal and Aromatic Plants'. The course has been approved by UGC for implementation.
- The faculty members of Department of Marathi designed and drafted a 'Certificate Course in Beauty Culture'. This interdisciplinary course was designed keeping in view of the local needs. The course has been approved by the UGC. The college implemented it from 2013-14.
- Department of Physics started photography course from academic year 2015-16.
- The IQAC has encouraged and facilitated all the departments in the college for running short-term, need-based and job oriented certificate courses. Accordingly, the college has made available 6 enrichment certificate courses to the students. All the courses are interdisciplinary and designed to suit the local needs of the students.

Criterion II **Teaching - Learning and Evaluation**

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Arts, Commerce and Science College, Sonai is one of the reputed institutions of higher learning in the rural area. However, the complete admission process along with the schedule of form submission, display of merit lists, seat allocations, fee structure and admission policy is displayed on the college website as well as on the notice-boards in the porch of main building and at prominent locations on the campus and it is updated from time to time.

Information regarding admission criteria, programmes offered, endowments, scholarships/free-ships, hostel accommodation and other student support facilities are provided in the college prospectus. Information regarding PG courses is published on college website.

The college follows online admission process which is widely published and transparent. The online process brings better control over the process. Application forms reach out to a wider section of the society. Applicant can apply anytime and from anywhere. The direct benefits of the online system are transparency in the whole process, 24 X 7 availability, no geographical boundaries, no long queues, reduction in paper work, reduction of human involvement; accurate, reliable and user friendly process.

- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.
 - Our college is a multi faculty college having Arts, Commerce, Science and Management courses such as B.B.A. and B.B.A. (C.A.). We offer Graduate and Postgraduate courses under these faculties.
 - The Under Graduate programmes are offered in Arts, Commerce, Science and Management courses such as B.B.A. and B.B.A. (C.A.). Students are admitted to these programmes according to the norms of SPP University, Pune and Govt. of Maharashtra policies. Seats for these programmes are distributed as per the Govt. of Maharashtra reservation policies.
 - For the Under Graduate programmes in F.Y.B.A. and F.Y.B.Sc. students are admitted on the merit basis. However, for under graduate programmes in Commerce the students are admitted on the first come first serve basis.
 - The Post Graduate programmes are offered in Arts, Commerce and Sciences faculties. Students are admitted to these programmes according to

- the norms of SPP University, Pune and Govt. of Maharashtra policies. The seats for these courses are distributed as per the Govt. of Maharashtra reservation rules. Students of M.Sc. I are admitted on the merit basis.
- Admissions to the Career Oriented programmes are made on the first come first serve basis. Students are admitted to these programmes according to the norms of SPP University, Pune and Govt. of Maharashtra policies.
- 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district?

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

- To review the admission process, class-wise admission committees are formed every year, which work under the supervision of the Principal. These committees prepare the detailed profile of students. This process makes the admission process transparent and gives justice to all the students from different categories. Because of this, the entire process becomes very easy for the students to seek admission as the admission committee members guide the students to fill up the admission forms properly and select the subjects / papers. The institution has achieved phenomenal success by going through this process as the process helps to save time and energy. The outcome of the process is that there is no complaint registered regarding the admissions.
- Yes, the admission process is governed by the SPP University, Pune norms and the Govt. of Maharashtra reservation rules. The students are informed about the admission schedule along with the documents necessary and payment of fees for it.
- The admission process is reviewed every year and steps are taken to improve the process. Instead of traditional system, online admission process is adopted.
- The following steps are taken to improve the admission process and increase quality intake.
 - a) The prospectus made available in softcopy on college website exhibits details of eligibility, documents required, subject groups, scholarships and fee details along with application and admission forms. This helps students to make a choice of stream and subjects as well as complete the admission process smoothly.

b) Students pay fees in the bank in the college premises and as a result 'cashless office'. Students get acknowledgement receipt mentioning stream, class and fee details.

Outcomes

Due to transparent online admission process, students from distant areas are taking admission to UG and PG courses in the college alongwith local students. Hence, the quality of students admitted to the programmes in the basic sciences has improved. Bright and motivated students are opting for the basic sciences.

- The demand and the avilability of seats remained almost same indicate that the demand for admission has remained constant.
- However, demand for Chemistry (P.G.) increased during 2011-12. Hence, M.Sc. - Analytical course has been started in 2012-13 and even the number of seats were increased by 10%.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity:

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Over the last four years, the college catered to the needs of physically challenged students.

- The college has made supportive infrastructural changes like ramp at the entrance of the college building.
- The college provides wheel chairs facilities.
- The following government policies are implemented to cater to the needs of the differently-abled students.
 - a) Separate exam seating arrangement.
 - b) Providing readers and writers for visually challenged students.
 - c) Providing extra time during exams as per University rules.
 - d) The Government Scholarships and Freeships.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, in order to assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills, the college has adopted the following processes:

- a) Determine the students' needs during the admission processes: This is handled by the members of the admission committee through one-toone counselling to help students in selecting appropriate subject combinations.
- b) In the first year (entry point), during the initial two weeks of commencement of the academic year, teachers are instructed to take special efforts on the review of the subjects, the students learnt in 10+2. Revision of the basics of the subjects helps in bridging the knowledge gap and bringing weaker students on par with others.
- c) During interactions in the classroom and laboratory, the teacher identifies the nature of support required by the students.
- d) Teachers update the teaching-plans accordingly so as to cater the needs of the academically weak students.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on / Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The college attempts to bridge the gap between students through the Remedial Coaching. To enrich the knowledge of the students, the college organizes guest lectures, students' seminars, projects, and special permission for the advanced and final year degree students to have open access into the stack and periodical sections of the library. The personal counseling is also given to the students. The COCs conducted in the college also help to enrich the students' knowledge.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college has Internal Complaints Committee for women's empowerment and prevention of sexual harassment.

The college has also conducted Environmental Audit of last five years of the college. The college has organized various extension activities through NCC and NSS units for environment awareness like rallies, lectures, publication of wallpapers, tree plantation, Save Earth programme, collection of Nirmalya on the occasion of Ganesh idol immersion, etc.

• Gender Equality Sensitization

- Gender equality and empowerment of women as well as the activities relating to these virtues are promoted at all levels.
- The students and faculty members of the college have organized rallies to spread the message of "BETI BACHAAO" drive.

- Our efforts to promote gender equality and women empowerment as are recognized by the Government of Maharashtra.
- The college has an active Women's Cell such as Vidyarthini Manch consisting of faculty members which observes and commemorates the Women related Days of importance.
- Women are felicitated for their work on the Women's Day with the Best Mother Award.
- Eminent women personalities from different fields are invited who interact with the students on women related issues.
- Every year during Durga Utsav, lectures, Cultural programmes and funny games on the women related issues are organized.
- The college adheres to the policy of coeducation of boys and girls to encourage healthy academic interaction between boys and girls. The boys and girls participate together in all extracurricular and co-curricular programmes.
- Several teaching departments and important college committees are headed by the women faculty members. The college encourages the organization and conduction of several programmes under the leadership of women staff members and girl students.
- The college encourages girl students to participate in the competitions, workshops, seminars and conferences.
- Our 20 science students (Boys and Girls students) attended the Indian Institute of Science, Banglore to build research and scientific approach among the students.
- Miss. Rani Darandale participated in various elocution, debating competition and won medals and prizes
- Miss. Devyani Pagire participated in the Republic Day Parade on 26th January 2016 at Delhi.
- Girls Health Checkup and Hb Checkup Camp are organized under health service scheme every year and girl students are given medical advice by the medical officer.

• Environment Conservation Sensitization

- The college has Environmental and Green audit committee which audits regularly for environment conservation and sensitization. Environmental studies are added as a compulsory subject for the students of second year of all UG programmes.
- Participation in national drive on cleanliness through NSS, NCC.
- Department of Chemistry uses microscale technique for conducting chemistry practical wherever possible.
- Biodiversity faces insecurity everywhere; hence the college is taking care of biodiversity in the premises as well as in the adjoining localities.
- Occurrence of faunal and floral diversity in the campus is maintained in the Zoology and Botany labs respectively.

- Department of Botany established botanical garden with plantation of local medicinal plants and has a green house. Tree plantation is our regular practice.
- We conduct polythene cleanliness drive in the campus and the surrounding locality.
- The students are allotted projects and assignment for internal assessment based on the environmental issues.
- Tree plantation programme is arranged at adopted village Morechinchore, Lohogaon and Zapwadi as well as college campus.

• Inclusion Sensitization

- Inclusion is about ensuring that no one feels left out because of age, gender, race, nationality, religion or belief, sexual orientation, physical or mental disabilities or social background. Therefore the college has taken Inclusion as a core value and incorporated it in all day to day activities.
- The college environment is friendly towards the differently-abled students.
- Students from all the castes and communities have due opportunity in all academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Poor students get financial support, freeships and other facilities. Some students are adopted by the *Yashwant Samajik Pratisthan* and staff members who support them during their academics.
- Computer awareness was provided by N.S.S. to Primary School Students.
- Our College students and Staff have participated in Eye Donation Campaign and Blood Donation Camp.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

- The advanced learners are identified during the induction programme on the basis of their previous academic performance.
- Students who excel in the academic performance during the continuous evaluation process are also identified as the advanced learners.
- Advanced learners are provided with guidance to realize their full potentials.
- They are provided with extra reading materials. They are guided to read original books, primary works, reference material and browse internet for advanced material.
- Advanced learners are motivated to prepare additional seminar papers on topics of their choice.
- They are also motivated to conduct and anchor the academic programmes organized in and outside the college.
- Advanced learners are allowed to participate in debates, quiz competitions, seminars, workshops and presentations, etc.

- Students are motivated to carry out their innovative research ideas and are allowed to participate in research project competition.
- They are exposed to eminent academicians and scientists who are invited in the college.
- Students also participate in conferences such as Indian Science Congress, Chemiquiz, Chemiad, Art exhibition, Commerce exhibition, etc.
- Advanced learners are also provided opportunities to participate in Industrial visits and selected for skill oriented courses, also provided training for research paper writing.
- Career guidance and placement cell provides counseling to advanced learners.
- They are also motivated for poster presentation, debate competition, speechcraft extempore and summer courses.
- They are appreciated by offering cash prizes and awards to inspire others to strive for excellence.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, and economically weaker sections, etc.)?
 - Majority of our students are from the disadvantaged and economically weaker sections of the society and other marginalized classes. Most of them are the first generation collegians belonging to poor families of farmers, manual laborers, rickshaw drivers and government employees who are not able to support their wards academically and financially for higher studies.
 - Such students who face the risk of being dropped out are identified. The faculty members directly discuss with such students and their parents to guide them out of their difficulties.
 - Data on the problems of the students are gathered, compiled and analyzed. The data are used to help the students, depending on their problems.
 - The following mechanisms are developed to handle the difficulties and problems hampering the progress of the students.

• Personal Interaction with the Students:

- The personal interactions and cordial relationships between students and teachers help easy identification of the problems of the students. The faculty members directly discuss the problems with students and try to guide them out of the difficulty. Teachers usually provide personal guidance to students who encounter problems.
- Some students are slow learners and experience difficulties in studies due to their inability to cope with the college environment. Slow learners are given special support by the teachers by taking time with them especially through personal guidance and support.

• Tutorials:

Weekly tutorials are conducted in some subjects, where each teacher spends one class hour with a small group of 16 ± 2 students and helps slow learners as per their needs.

• Attendance Records:

At the end of each semester, attendance of the students is calculated as a part of the continuous assessment and students at potential risk of drop out are identified. These students are given special attention.

• Parent Teacher Meetings:

A parent teacher meeting is arranged during academic year. In this meeting, the principal and teachers meet the parents to talk about the performance of their wards and get feedback from parents.

• Departmental Meetings:

- Departmental meeting at the commencement of new session evaluate the academic and other activities of the previous session.
- The performance of students in the university examination of the last semester is recorded and discussed.
- Remedial measures in accordance with the discussions of the meeting to improve the performance of students are initiated.

• Continuous Assessment Tests:

- Teachers identify students with problems during the conduct of internal test papers and other academic exercises.
- Poor academic performance is an indicator of probable dropout. The teachers provide counseling to such needy students.

• Schemes, Facilities and Initiatives:

- The socioeconomic background and condition is identified as the key factor which hinders the progress of students.
- Our college offers part time jobs to economically weaker students under the EARN WHILE LEARN scheme.
- Some of our staff members are supporting economically weaker and needy students as well as orphan girl students.
- Our staff voluntarily contributes towards financial help to economically weaker students.
- Reading room facility is established in the girls' hostel for non hosteller and needy girl students. The college thus has several mechanisms, practices and initiatives to minimize the number of the students at risk of drop out.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)

Planning and organizing the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules is completed in the beginning of every academic year through formulating academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print.

• Academic Calendar

- At the end of every academic session, the academic calendar for the next session is prepared detailing the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules. The same details are provided in the college prospectus, and on the college website www.acssonaicollege.com
- The faculty wise timetable is prepared in the beginning of each semester by time table in-charges. The time table with course distribution is displayed on notice boards as well as on the college website.
- The college follows the time frame provided by the University and Joint Director Higher Education, Pune division, Govt. of Maharashtra.

Teaching Plan

The syllabi is discussed in the departmental meetings and distributed among the faculty members. Each teacher formulates the teaching plan of the allotted syllabi, before the beginning of the session. The teachers communicate their teaching plans to the students.

Evaluation

- SPP University, Pune, has prescribed the semester system for the programmes in the faculties of Science and B.B.A. and B.B.A. (Computer Application). It has prescribed annual pattern for programmes in Arts and Commerce faculties. The University has prescribed choice based credit system at PG level.
- Students are examined and their works are evaluated as per the schedule and the norms of SPP University, Pune for this purpose. For the academic evaluation of students in the semester system, and session end examinations are adopted.
- The continuous assessment includes marks for seminar presentation, assignments, projects, field/industrial visits and test papers.
- In the annual pattern, apart from annual university examinations, the students are also evaluated through tests, tutorials, and oral test. The teachers evaluate the test, tutorials and discuss with the students in class room as well as in laboratories.
- The student assignments, projects, field visits and seminars are evaluated according to the university guidelines. The conduction of the tests, tutorials and internal assessment form the basis of evaluating the performance of the students throughout the year.
- After the evaluation, the assignments and answer papers of test are handed over to students to ensure transparency. There is a feedback system on the results of internal assessment.
- After the continuous assessment marks are displayed on the class notice board so that students can verify it. For any discrepancy, the students can

meet the concerned teacher and if required can approach the Head of Department and also to the Principal to present their grievances. Thereafter, marks are rectified and sent to the university.

• The session end examinations are scheduled, conducted and evaluated by the University for all the Programmes. Students are given guidance on model answers, formulation of answers and other necessary materials for the university examination.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

• IQAC for Use of ICT in Teaching-Learning Process

IQAC plays a crucial role in ensuring, sustenance and enhancement of quality of the teaching- learning process. It conducts frequent meetings with the aim of improving the teaching learning processes. These meetings are one-to-one meetings as well as departmental meetings, where teaching learning processes, course plans, ICT enabled teaching-learning process, assessment and evaluation, research and planning and monitoring of the quality of the teaching-learning process are discussed.

• IQAC for Assessment and Evaluation

- IQAC has taken the initiative to frame the Student Teacher Evaluation Format. This format is employed for the evaluation of the performance of the teachers by the students in our college.
- IQAC also guides and suggests in allotment of need based topics for projects and seminars.
- IQAC has formulated a system of academic audit of all the departments and its teachers.
- IQAC visits every department and assists the department heads to frame the guidelines of the academic audit.

• IQAC for Research

- The college has a research centre in Commerce. IQAC has set up a college coordination committee, to coordinate the research undertaken by the departments. The research coordination committee has therefore been established which monitors all research programmes, research projects and research activities in the college.
- IQAC has suggested monitoring of every ongoing research work in college. Therefore, presentation of six monthly report of every individual research work before the research coordination committee has been made mandatory.
- IQAC motivates the PG students and faculty to present their research work at national and international conferences / seminars / Symposia / Congress organized within the country and abroad.
- Librarian contributes by addition of learning resources like journals and books. He periodically sends the list of new arrivals and updates on interesting reading material that he comes across. A dedicated notice board displays new arrivals.

• IQAC for Quality of Teaching-Learning Process

- The IQAC motivates the teachers to opt for modern teaching learning methods and tools. It has organized an orientation programme on how to use different audio visual aids.
- IQAC convenes academic meetings of the Principal, Vice-Principal and all the Heads of Departments to chalk out the academic aspects on a regular basis.
- IQAC meetings are held periodically to monitor and follow up the planning and scheduling of teaching-learning and evaluation process in the college.
- Seminars, conferences, workshops, etc are organized under the guidance of IQAC for the benefit of the faculty and the students.
- IQAC invites eminent resource persons and arranges expert lecture series for the students.
- 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?
 - A student-centric academic and co-curricular environment is provided in the college. Some strategies are implemented for student-centric learning and for providing adequate support structures and systems for teachers to develop interactive, collaborative and independent learning among the students.
 - There is always a one to one interaction between teacher and the students, in Labs, during field visits, and in the premises. ICT based teaching learning environment, with high speed internet access is used as a platform for teacher-student academic interaction.
 - Research-oriented projects are allotted to the students. Such projects allow the students to develop skill to think scientifically and to create research temperament. Creative home assignments and seminars as internal assessments encourage self-study and create skill of self reliant and involvement. Experiences during regular field work/visits are shared in the class where interactive and collaborative learning understandings are reflected upon.
 - Some local, regional, national and international issues and concerns are also discussed in the classes, which promote the students to build up their thoughts related to such issues and concerns. It creates independent learning among the students.
 - The PG and research students are encouraged to conduct guidance classes for UG students. Debate competitions are arranged for the students and by the students during the celebration of birth anniversary of great men and during similar events.

- Wi-Fi enabled campus allows the students to easily access the e-learning resources on their own. ICT enabled seminars and sessions make the learning interactive and collaborative for the students. Movies relevant to the demand of syllabi are screened to have reflection as independent learning process.
- Confidence and capacity building strategies for students include library orientation, soft skill development, life skill training, awareness and training programmes for utilizing institutional facilities and discussion of topics in small groups.
- Other institutional initiatives to make learning student-centric are, subject associations formed in different departments run by the students with a faculty in charge, celebration and observation of the days of importance, Speechcraft, guest lectures, poster presentation, paper presentation, exhibitions, etc.
- Study groups are formed during practicals and for allotting the projects which generate interactive and collaborative learning. Partner system team-up slow learner students with advanced learners promotes intra students mentoring.
- Internet for staff and PG students allows help in productive sharing of resources, discussions, arguments, problems solving and legitimate refreshments. For interactive learning, there are computers for presentations. LCD projectors and sound system are available in most of the departments.
- The well equipped laboratories, Botanical garden, digital English language learning lab and study center support the teaching learning process.
- The central library has a good collection of books, journals and e-resources for the benefit of students and faculty. Students can collect the material relevant to their studies and research work from the library. The NLIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) online journals and e-books provide reference material to the students.
- Contact details of the faculty are provided in the college prospectus and on the college website. The students can contact their teachers for any clarification regarding the academics. The teachers are always available to the students to solve their difficulties.
- The teachers are encouraged to attend the orientation and refresher courses to update their knowledge and learn the modern student-centric teaching methods. Teachers also share their newly acquired expertise among themselves and generate a student-centric atmosphere in the premises.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

- Promotion of research is one of the goals of the college. The college has evolved several strategies to nurture the spirit of critical and logical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students.
- Seminar presentation where student has to prepare for seminar and present it before his classmates. Faculty members put current issues for discussions in class.
- We expose our students to National and State level scientific events such as Indian Science Congress, Avishkar, etc. where they present their research work.
- Annual college magazine "Saraswat" provides a platform for the expression of creativity and critical reflections of the students.
- Research coordination committee of the college fosters critical thinking and scientific temperament among the researchers.
- We have activities like faculty associations and exhibitions that promote critical and scientific thinking. Movies that provoke students to think differently are screened.
- Theme based competitions on posters, debate, poetry, essays, and slogan are conducted to enhance creative as well as critical thinking of the students. Our students actively participate in the Youth festivals of different universities, and in sports competitions at local, state and national level which also require creativity and scientific temperament.
- Marathi litterateurs are invited for interaction with students.
- Students participate in research events such as AVISHKAR.
- Study centers play critical role in imbibing value education.
- Students' participation in slogan, poster, and paper presentation competition provoke critical thinking and creativity.
- Training is imparted to the students on interior decoration, fashion shows, food "*Thaali*" decoration, flower arrangements and Rangoli drawings during the socio cultural events organized in the college
- The students of Beauty Culture Course participate in inauguration of different programmes where creativity and critical thinking are employed.
- Students participate in street plays, mimes for the sake of benefits of the society, etc. These are written and directed by the students requiring lot of creativity and critical thinking. The students attend invited talks and prepare the reports and reviews for the publication in the news paper.
- Surveys and action projects are integrated into the programmes to encourage innovations for the benefits of the communities. The students are involved in the community work through the activities of NSS and NCC.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? e. g: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through

Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The college always believes that for the effective teaching, modern technologies and devices must be provided to the faculty. Therefore, the college executes the following practices:

- Under the National Mission on Education through ICT (NMEICT) programme of the Ministry of Human Resources Development, Govt. of India and Bharat Sanchar Nigam Ltd. (BSNL) has provided 10 Mbps leaseline to our college. WiFi Internet connectivity in the college premises is available.
- The college has subscribed to the INFLIBNET (Information and Library Network); therefore, e-learning resources, scholarly content and research publications have become available to the students and staff of the college through NLIST (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content). The students and staff have been provided with access to the NLIST resources available at http://nlist.inflibnet.ac.in. The researchers are encouraged to use "Shodh-Ganga" which is a project of UGC that gives access to the theses of Indian universities in e-form.
- Software for research analysis, GIS software in Geography department for GPS and land resources.
- English Language Laboratory with necessary hardware and software is available.
- The staff and students use MS PowerPoint, MS Word and MS Excel or similar computer programmes for teaching learning process.
- The college encourages judicious use of social media like group e-mail, Facebook and Whatsapp to facilitate sharing of teaching strategies among the staff.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and Skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- Talks of scholars, experts, activists, etc. are arranged by the college to expose the faculty and students to advanced level of knowledge and skills. Such programmes also provide an opportunity of interaction and exchange of ideas leading to a synthesis and inspiration of new and novel ideas. Some of such regular interactive programmes are, Alumni Meet and intellectual lectures by persons who have excelled in various fields and walks of life.
- Interactions with eminent academicians /scientists are organized for the students and faculty.
- National and international level journals, latest reference books and other sources are made available to teachers and students.
- Teachers attend refresher courses, orientation courses, training programmes, workshops, seminars and conferences and acquire the knowledge of recent developments in scientific and other research.

- National level conferences / seminars have been organized for faculty and workshops for the students. The college has successfully arranged Teachers and Students Exchange Programme.
- Students are encouraged to prepare charts for their class rooms and laboratories.
- The college has been participating in the District and University level "Avishkar" competitions and workshops.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students\benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advises) provided to students?

- The college has a number of processes which support the students who face problems at the academic, personal and psycho-social front, and give them proper guidance.
- The teachers help students during the times of crisis.
- The teachers play an important role in identifying the academic, psychological and personal needs of the students.
- The college provides counseling services to the students and conducts sessions on personal and career guidance through experts. Psychiatrist Miss. Sukanya Phanslakar provides personal counseling to the students.
- The college provides value based education through the activities like Ganpati Festival, Sonai Navratri Utsav, Administering pledge of cleanliess, the constitution of India and simple marriage, by encouraging students to participate in "Beti Bachav" programme and by creating awareness about voters' right. The college has initiated activities like daily playing of national anthem and motivational song of Yashwant Samajik Pratisthan as well as by displaying the inspirational quotes from great philosophers.
- Students are also encouraged to participate in NSS and NCC programmes on field work.
- The college has established Competitive Exam Centre in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* which regularly organizes training and guest lectures to make the students aware about the career opportunities.
- English communication skills, confidence level, presentation skills, interview skills, personality development and psychological counseling of students and many other topics are dealt with Soft Skill Development Programme.

- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - Audio visual and multimedia based teaching learning using online videos and other resources.
 - Research based projects are allotted to students.
 - Digital English language lab, speech craft, English movies based on prescribed syllabus are some of the innovations used in English department.
 - Department of History and Geography organize study tours to historical places and monuments.
 - Department of Botany organizes botanical excursions to different locations for studying the plant forms and species whereas zoological excursions are organized for observation of insects, beetals, reptiles, birds and animals.
 - Department of Chemistry and Physics organize industrial visits to understand the processes and products.
 - Faculty actively involves in writing research articles, text books and reference books.
 - Some topics are assigned to students for the self learning and they are encouraged to discuss in the class.
 - Students are encouraged to search and use appropriate scholarly resources in their presentations.
 - M.Sc. Chemistry, M.Com., B.B.A. and B.B.A. (C.A.) students are assigned dissertation / research projects for developing in depth understanding of the concepts by means of data collection and analysis.
 - Students are motivated to read reference books and present papers in conferences and seminars.
 - Students are rewarded with recognitions, awards and prizes for their creativity, innovation and hard work.
 - Practice oriented teaching in Mathematics and Life Sciences through specific assignments for practicing derivation, figures, diagrams, etc.
 - Institution encourages and supports the faculty to participate in the Faculty Improvement Programme of UGC to complete Ph.D.
 - The institution encourages and permits teachers to participate in seminars/conferences/workshops to adopt new ideas to use in the teaching learning process.
 - Students participate in debates and essay writing competitions.

- The teaching innovations have positive impact on student learning which has reflected in university examinations results. Few students have scored more percentage of marks compaired to (10+2) result.
- More students are opting for higher education. Students are joining Post Graduate programmes, a few of them have cleared NET / SET / PET and joined Ph.D. programmes. Many students have started appearing for competitive examinations and a few of them cleared.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

- The most integral aspect of teaching-learning process is the institutional library that is consistently used by faculty to enhance the teaching learning process.
- Our central library is a huge treasure of books.
- Books-23393, Journals and Periodicals-45, Bound Volumes- 650, Maps-200, CD-ROMs-250, Project Reports-200, E-Books-4GB.
- Our library offers several user friendly services including Reference service, Bibliographical service, Newspaper Clipping service, Reprographic services and Book Bank.
- Library organizes Book Exhibition for selection of books under Best Library Practices Initiative.
- The college has recently initiated a drive namely 'Library where village is' in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan*.
- New arrivals are displayed and students are motivated to make effective use of them for achieving academic excellence.
- Hardback volumes of journals in print and electronic format are provided to the students.
- e-resources through subscribed e-journals and Compact Disks databases are available with library.
- The faculty makes extensive use of both the departmental as well as the central library for preparing study and teaching material, referring materials relevant to prescribed texts as well as on the topics or issues included in the curricula.
- Collection of e-books and e-journals are used while writing research papers, seminars and presentations for invited talks.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

• The institution faces minimum hurdles in completing the curriculum as the planning and organizing of academic activities is in accordance with the academic calendar of the University.

- The faculty prepares a well organized course plan and over the years it has helped in the completion of the curriculum within the time frame and calendar.
- At the beginning of each academic session a unit wise teaching plan is prepared by each faculty member, which is monitored by the Head of Department and Principal.
- In unavoidable circumstances, the curriculum is completed by engaging extra classes.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning.

The college makes consistent efforts in developing evaluation systems to assess the quality of teaching-learning. The college IQAC closely monitors quality of teaching learning and suggests reforms for improvements and use of new techniques in the processes. Some of the mechanisms developed over the years to monitor and evaluate are:

- Academic progress of the students is assessed by means of tests, continuous internal assessment, session end tests, quizzes, seminars, home and class assignments, presentations, field work and excursions, conferences, dissertations, co-curricular activities and viva voce.
- Evaluation of teachers by students at the end of academic session using feedback forms.
- SWOC of each department helps in evaluation and monitoring also inputs from suggestion box act as feedback and helps in monitoring.
- The IQAC through academic audit monitors the progress of the department and progress of staff evaluated through API, especially when required for CAS.
- ISO 9001:2008 has been established and accordingly academic audit carried out half yearly.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

• Recruitment of the Teachers:

- The appointments of teachers are made as per the qualification prescribed by the UGC, reservation and service rules of Govt. of Maharashtra and approval of SPP University, Pune.
- The appointments are made on the merit basis and in a transparent manner by the management.
- Teaching posts are filled by inviting applications through advertising in national and local newspapers. The received applications are screened

and scrutinized. The applicants are interviewed by the duly constituted selection committee.

- The newly recruited teachers are gradually inducted into the college life by involving them in various committees and assignments.
- Some of the teaching posts in the college have not been filled as the Govt. has not sanctioned new posts in the last three years; however, to ensure that the students do not suffer due to the unfilled teaching posts, the Management has made provisions and appointed temporary teachers.
- The college has also made provisions for the visiting faculty to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum and need for specialized faculty.

• Retention of Teachers

- Retention of the eminent faculty members has not been a serious problem for the college.
- During the last five years only three members have been selected to the post of principal.
- Some of the faculties have been transferred to the other colleges of the parent society as needed by parent society.
- All staff members are considered as the part of one "Parivar". Every teacher is given functional autonomy to discharge his duties and responsibilities.
- The college recognizes achievements and contributions of its teachers by appreciating and honoring them in staff common meetings and annual social gathering.
- There are 21 teachers with Ph.D. as highest qualification and 3 teachers with M.Phil as highest qualification and 14 teachers are NET/SET qualified.
- 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.
 - To meet the needs and demands of the students, M.Sc. (Analytical and Organic Chemistry), M.A. (English, Hindi and History), M.Com. B.B.A., B.B.A. (Computer Application) programmes have been introduced in the college.
 - The college has got a good mixture of highly qualified senior as well as junior teachers to meet the teaching needs of the newly introduced programmes.
 - The college invites and arranges guest lecturers in emerging areas by the professionals to supplement the regular classroom teaching.

- The teachers regularly attend courses on issues like research methodology, human rights, environment conservation, wild life conservation etc. to update their knowledge.
- We regularly invite eminent persons and subject experts for events and programmes related to social, economic, scientific and political issues such as Right to Information, Human Rights, Cyber security, gender equality drive, global warming, etc.
- The college invites visiting faculty and inter departmental visiting faculty for specialized topics.
- New faculties with expertise in the newly introduced self financed programmes have been appointed on clock hour basis to cope with the teaching needs.
- 'Course in Spoken English for Teachers' was organized for improving fluency in English during 5/08/2014 to the end of October. Around 35 teachers participated in the program.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes. The college has formulated a feedback system for the evaluation of teachers every year. The feedback in a structured proforma is submitted to the Principal. The Feedback Committee critically analyzes the feedback from the students and intimates the teachers for corrective measures, if necessary. The suggestion box installed in the college is also means of collecting evaluation of teachers from the students. The evaluation helps the teachers to understand their strengths and weaknesses. The feedback is used to make improvement in the performance of the faculty. This practice has proved very useful as far as teaching-learning process is concerned.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The schedule for evaluation given in the Academic Calendar is displayed on notice boards and on the college website.

 Students are informed about the evaluation system at the beginning of the academic sessions, during orientation programmes and at appropriate intervals.
- Students are also intimated about the assessment / examinations, nature, format and weightage of marks for topics prescribed by the University.
- Students are provided with question banks, list of books and resources.
- The detailed schedule for examinations for UG programmes and continuous assessment for PG programmes is displayed on the notice boards and is strictly implemented.
- The schedule for examinations is conveyed to the teachers in advance through the "Academic and Activity Calendar" uploaded on the college website.
- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

• Evaluation reforms of the university:

• The university has prescribed annual pattern for UG level: First, Second and Third Year B.A., B.Com. and First year B.Sc., B.B.A. and B.B.A. (C.A.) whereas Second and Third year B.Sc., B.B.A., B.B.A. (C.A.) and for PG programmes there is semester pattern.

• Evaluation reforms of the college:

- The college has faculty wise examination committees to carry out the effective implementation of internal assessment and college examination.
- The committee plans and implements assessment process to evaluate the students' performance.
- The committee prepares college examination schedules, collects question
 papers on the stipulated dates, allots supervision duties to faculties, and
 conducts examinations, collects assessed answer sheets and prepares
 results.
- PG students' internal assessment process is carried out at the department level.
- Fieldwork / Visit are also part of assessments in some subjects, and the evaluation is done on overall performance of the student during the visit and a comprehensive report is submitted thereon.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- College makes every effort to effectively implement the evaluation reforms of the university:
- The Central Examination Committee prepares the Examination Schedule for UG internal examination. In-house faculty is duly assigned supervision work to ensure stringent vigilance during examination. The supervision chart is sent to respective departments well in advance. The faculty is assigned supervision duty also for the final examination.
- For F.Y.B.A. / B.Com. / B.Sc. / B.B.A. and B.B.A. (C.A.) internal and final examinations, Central Assessment Programme (CAP) is arranged and timetable in this regard is circulated to respective departments for the information of concerned examiners. Teachers are requested to give their contact details during vacation for any emergency concerning examination / marks entry.
- Internal examination marks are displayed in the respective departments for students. Queries and grievances, if any, are sorted out and attended within 10 days.
- Lectures on Cyber Security are scheduled and conducted centrally. Question papers are typed by B.B.A. (C.A.) and are sent along with answer keys to PG departments. The examination is conducted as per the schedule fixed centrally.

- For effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the college:
 - Detailed schedule of internal examination at UG and PG is communicated to students in advance.
 - Heads of department / PG coordinators call a meeting of the department faculty if any new evaluation method has to be used for assessment.
 Suggestions given by faculty are considered and new methods, if found suitable, are approved unanimously.
 - The Heads of department / coordinators monitor effective and timely implementation of the system and procedure of evaluation. Meetings are held with the department faculty as and when required.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Students are assessed based on formative assessment which is customized to suit the objective of the subject and summative assessment as prescribed by the University:

- Formative assessment includes Seminar presentation, short quizzes, assignments, Extension Work, an Open Book Test (with the concerned teacher deciding which books are to be allowed for this purpose) and Mini Research Project by an individual student or a group of students, role playing, workshops, communication skills, etc.
- The college provides opportunities to students to exhibit their knowledge through the medium of expression (oral / written) desired by the student.
- The outcome of the entire exercise is that the evaluation method does not become a hurdle while evaluating students.
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

Showing answer sheets to the students helps in maintaining transparency. While no weightage is assigned specifically to different aspects of student development, aspects such as communication skills get tested through written tests as well as viva voce. Projects, presentations and group discussions allow scope for testing the capacity for independent exploration and learning, while enhancing communicative abilities. As of now, there is no provision for evaluating behavioral aspects through the University Evaluation mechanism or even at the college level.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college / affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The major graduate attributes of the college are as follows: The student should be:

- acquainted with the social and moral responsibilities as well as communication skills.
- enabled to earn his own living and life skills.
- made ready to acquire decision-making ability.
- prepared to strive for overall personality development and responsible global citizen.
- awakened for environmental concerns.
- made competent for acquiring sound knowledge of the subject.

The college ensures attainment of these graduate attributes by the students through the following activities:

- Personality development programmes.
- Life-skill development programmes.
- Communication skill development courses.
- Cultural activities.
- Sports activities.
- Various competitions.
- Practical-based teaching.
- Organization of speeches by the eminent persons.
- Blood-donation and health awareness, etc.
- Introduction of Career Orientation Courses.
- Participating in the extension activities organized by NSS and NCC.
- Inculcating discipline and patriotism among the students through the NCC.
- Motivation for eye donation and drive of formfilling.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation? Both at the college and University level?

The college and university have a well defined process for redressing the grievances with reference to evaluation. The following processes provide a brief overview of the grievance redressal system.

• Process (I):

- Examination form filling: On-line as per the timetable of the University.
- Grievance: Discrepancies in name, selection of subjects, etc.
- Correction mechanism by the college examination cell:
- Appropriate form is filled in by the student to make necessary corrections within the stipulated time period. This is reported to University Examination Centre. After authentication, the University Examination Centre makes the necessary corrections.

• Process (II):

- Evaluation Grievance: Revaluation of answersheets.
- Correction mechanism: College Examination Cell.
 - 1.A student can obtain photocopy of answer sheet of the desired subject by filling on-line application on the University website.

- 2.Students submit this form to the college Examination Cell, which is duly forwarded to the University Examination Cell after due authentication.
- 3. The student gets the photocopy of the answer sheet within stipulated time.
- 4.If students desire revaluation of the answer sheets then he / she needs to apply by filling the online form on the University website within 10 days after receving the photocopies. The form is authenticated and forwarded by the college Examination Cell.
- 5. The university looks into the grievance and takes the final decision in the matter.

• Process (IV):

- Other Grievances: Discrepancies in Marksheet.
- Correction mechanism: The College Examination Cell asks for a written application from the student regarding the grievance.
- The individual application is sent along with supporting documents to the Controller of Examinations, who then scrutinizes and makes corrections, if any, within 15 days, the revised document is sent to the college and then delivered to the student.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the college has clearly stated learning outcomes for all the programmes. The details are as follows:

- The students are made aware of these learning outcomes in the first interaction / orientation programmes where the Principal addresses all the students.
- The teaching staff from all the departments of the college formulates learning outcomes for each course, for every academic year and these are communicated to the students at the beginning of the academic year and it is specified in the quality manual of ISO 9001:2008 document.
- Graduate attributes for students are well defined in terms of communication skills, life skills, universal values and problem solving abilities.
- 2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course / programme? Provide an analysis of the students' results / achievements (Programme / Course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes / courses offered.
 - The marks of each assessment (conducted by the college) are displayed on the Department Notice Board.

- A collective list of marks obtained by students in all internal assessments is also displayed/made available to the students through which students can compare their performance.
- The departments also prepare 'subject wise' result sheets after the results are declared by the University.

2.6.4 What are the measures / initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The students are instructed by the faculty about the social and economic aspects of particular subjects. The students are taken to the field visits to acquaint them with the social relevance of the subject. The activities like tree plantation, anti-superstition drive, conservation of nature, environment awareness, cleanliness campaign, Save the Baby Girls Campaign, Anti-dowry movement, women's empowerment programmes, Save Energy Drive, Eye donation, Blood Donation, Water conservation, Cleanliness programmes for Shani Shingnapur and Kautuki river, simple marriage, etc. are organized to show the social relevance of the concerned subjects.

The institution has setup a Placement Cell for the students, which tries to open the doors for getting employment in the various organizations. Yashwant Study Club for Competitive Examination also guides the students to prepare for particular competitive examination. The college also invites entrepreneurs, who share their experiences with students and help them to understand the methods to be followed to become successful entrepreneurs. The college initiated and made MoU's with small scale industries *viz.* milk and dairy farms, Co-operative Banks, Credit societies, Mula Sugar Factory, Shraddha Food Products, Sonai and students share their experience with them.

Innovation and research aptitude is developed among the students by allowing them to participate in seminars, workshops, conferences, demonstration and project work. The college motivates students to participate in the innovative and research activities by guiding them to take part in Avishkar Competition, debating, essay writing, quiz, competitions, etc. are organized for creative thinking. They are also motivated to write in the college annual 'Saraswat' to generate creativity and innovative aptitude.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The students' performance is collected from the university and internal examination results. These results are analyzed by the departments. Accordingly, where the results are low, the instructions are given to the concerned faculty to bring the slow learners at par with the other students. The slow learners are also guided through the remedial coaching scheme. A feedback is also taken from the students on teaching of the curriculum, infrastructure, etc. through structured feedback forms and suggestion box.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college monitors the achievement of the learning outcomes through the analysis of the results of the college and university examinations. As soon as results are declared, each department analyses the results of their students. This analysis helps to decide in which subject / paper the students are lagging behind and need attention. Taking this analysis into consideration, the plans are prepared to overcome these shortcomings.

In the beginning of the academic year, a timetable and an academic calendar are prepared. It is ensured that lectures are engaged by the staff as per the timetable, and they are recorded in teaching plan. The timetable committee, the Principal and IQAC monitor the execution of academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and ensure the achievements of learning outcomes.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, teachers use assessment / evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. Monitoring the students' progress is an integral part of the functioning of the college. For PG students, the CBCS, a continuous assessment method, is followed. Students are evaluated based on their assignments, orals, presentations, role playing, laboratory and field work. All these are parts of their continuous assessment. Their performance is assessed and feedback is communicated to the students immediately.

Subject wise analysis of results and mark lists showing comparative performance of students in internal assessment examinations are prepared. The data help in understanding academic weaknesses of the student. The student is counseled to seek improvement. The interpretation of the entire process is used to make the teaching methods more learners oriented.

• Achievements:

- 1. Total 22 students from Arts, Commerce and Science faculty passed NET / SET exam and some of them got M.Phil and Ph.D Degree in the last four years.
- 2. M.Sc. Chemistry students got placed in various institutes *viz.* NCL, Pune; Sun Pharma, Ahmednagar; Centuar Pharmaceutical, Pune; Emcure Pharmaceutical, Daund; Galaxy Laboratory, Aurangabad and Gharada Agrochemicals, Chiplun.
- 3. Total 7 students passed competitive exam in MPSC

- 5. A few Commerce students completed chartered accountant exam and established their business.
- 6. Total 45 Students participated in Research Competition Aviskar conducted by SPP University, Pune.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

a) Autonomy to the principal investigator:

The principal investigator of research project(s) funded by external funding agency enjoys freedom to carry out and implement the project. Freedom is given to the principal investigator to purchase equipment / instruments and consumables as per his / her needs.

b) Timely availability or release of resources:

Resources are made available to the principal investigator. The RCC coordinator looks into the requirements and procurement of instruments and special facilities required for conducting the research project.

c) Adequate infrastructure and human resources:

The college provides research facilities, essential research infrastructure, research journals, e-journals and reference books. Internet facilities, including Wi-Fi are available free of charge, and adequate laboratory space along with water and power supply is also provided. The faculties are asked to prepare a budget for the ensuing year indicating the requirements of research. The college immediately sanctions demands for the replacement or purchase of equipment. Besides this, adequate assistance is also sought from other faculties in research activities.

d) Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers:

The faculty members are sanctioned study / duty leave to pursue their research, and also to attend seminars, conferences, workshops, to present their research work. They are also provided TA and DA as per the university norms.

e) Support in terms of technology and information needs:

The RCC plays vital role in overall conduct of research activities in the college. The college has installed an aerial line of 10 Mbps for internet connectivity. All departments have sufficient number of computers and peripherals, which help the researcher to gain information and knowledge required in their respective areas of interest. The central library subscribed to national and international journals. The college has also a member of UGC-NLIST-INFLIBNET through which e-journals are made available.

f) Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding agencies.

All auditing certificates are timely prepared and submitted to the funding agencies.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

- The science association arranges posters presentation on different issue like water management, disaster management etc. help in nurturing the scientific temper.
- Arranging Expert Lectures through Science Association.

• Avishkar Research Competitions:

Over years, there has been active participation of students in the *Avishkar*. The RCC encourages the participation of students by organizing interactive sessions with experts and providing teacher mentors.

Overall 650 students participated from all over India, from institutes like IIT, IISER, IISC, and other universities like SPP University, Pune, Hyderabad University etc. The camp was featured by 12 lectures by reputed scientists from different corners of the world and they encouraged students for career in basic science research.

- Experienced persons from the industries are invited by the colleges in the local, regional and national events such as seminars, conferences, workshops and invited talks in order to facilitate maximum exposure and closer interaction. - The college has signed MOU's with industries, research institutes and colleges for having interaction on various levels of academic and research.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The Institution and the students engage in community extension programmes, such as service to humanity. Institution provides below given details of the various programmes that foster community network and contribute to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development:

• National Service Scheme.

The Institution has a vibrant National Service Scheme with more than 150 volunteers. The aim of this unit is to inculcate among students a feeling of sacrifice, a spirit of service and a sense of togetherness. The NSS unit of the Institution has brought great laurels to the college for their performance: The Institution has adopted the **More Chinchore** rural village of Newasa Tahasil in Ahmednagar District. The college has run different programmes in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* as follows:

• Mahila Swayam Sahayata Bachat Gats (Women Self Help Saving Groups):

Women are supposed to be the wheels of the family chariot. Today women are educated; they can understand the transactions and shoulder to shoulder with men can work out the financial matters. Women are more practical if compared with men. With this motive, *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* raised the movement of Women Self Help Saving Groups in Newasa taluka. One perfect movement of Women Self Help Saving Groups was raised consisting 1720 Groups. Without pause, the movement led into the loan disbursement of Rs.16 crore to saving groups and availed the subsidy of amount Rs. 2 crore in Newasa taluka in collaboration of *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* and Shardatai Foundation, Sonai. The resolution was passed to avail the loan on 0 % interest. Today women have become self-reliant and have dominated the financial sectors of the society as their purses are full of money. The faculty and students of the college

provide different kinds of assistance to the Women Self Help Saving Groups like providing guidance on how to write minutes of the meetings or how to keep records.

• Beautification of the Kautiki River:-

Splendor of any town is enhanced by its river that flows by. The Kautiki river is very closely associated with the lives of Sonaietes and it preserves the typical ambience of the village. The breadth of the river, the murmuring water and the traders on its bank were the glimpses of the river. *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* made endeavors to restore the six decades old glory of the river. The efforts were made for beautification with plantation at the hands of 11 women, 11 youths and senior citizens. Freshening ambience was sought by renovating archaic well, small well, cleaning of the breadth of the river and implanting benches. Consequently, children play on the side by grounds in the midst of twittering of the birds in the trees. The students of the college have participated in the drive.

• A Visit to Shri Savitribai Phule Pune University:// n hi dynanen sadrusham pavitra mih vidyate //

The students always fancy about the university from where they get their education. The students hope for the opportunity to sightsee the university. *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* organized such event/ activity as never before in the history of Savitribai Phule Pune University. Prashant Patil Gadakh, President of the Pratishtan initiated the efforts to tour the students of 126 colleges of various streams. On the occasion he expressed that the university campus is the Pandhari and Pune University is Pandurang. Dr. Narendra Kadu, the Registrar of the university, mentioned that such collective visit of students was the unique and the first of its own kind in the history of the university. The students visited and noted the information of every subject department, exam. section, library, different meeting halls, V.C. office, Registrar office and the entire campus of the university. The students would long cherish the unforgettable moments.

• EYE DONATION PROGRAMME IN COLLABORATION WITH YASHWANT SAMAJIK PRATISHTAN

There are thousands of people who can't see the beautiful world due to the loss of sight. A very few efforts have been made at national level for eye donation. Considering this, The College resolved for the eye donation drive in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishthan, Sonai*.

Instead of burying or cremating, if the dead body can help to kindle the light in the life of blinds, then the act would turn out to be the supreme service to humanity. The act of donating eyes of the close relative in the midst of sorrow of the death itself is a painful act. So the students and the activists have to take a lot of efforts to convince the family for eye donation. At present, 19,600 people have filled and submitted the resolution forms with the Pratishtan. 264 people have donated their eyes thereby benefitting directly 528 blinds.

• Social Awareness Drive through News:

Students wrote the news at public places, on the notice board of Vividh Karyakari Society, Sonai and Sonai Grampanchayat. The news was written in order to create scientific awareness among the people. The news dealt with the three Noble prize winner Scientists who worked on DNA that will help to cure cancer by technical modification -08/10/2015. The news dealt with the new invention of gravitational waves -08/02/2016. The following students of M.Sc. Part-I worked as volunteers: Vinod Ghawate, Pravin Jagtap and Rameshwar Jadhav

• Eye donation.

With the motive that we too owe something to society, the Mission of Eyedonation was started on the occasion of the Birthday of Hon'ble Yashwantrao Gadakh on 12th May 2010 in the presence of Saint Bhaskargiri Maharaj at the holy place Deogadh. On the very day 9000 rural folk from common families as well as from all strata of society filled in the resolution forms and made it a historical event. At present, 19,600 people have filled and submitted the resolution forms with the Pratishtan. 264 people have donated their eyes thereby benefitting directly 528 blinds.

Eye donation mementos have been presented to the family members of the eye donors in order to honor them for the social work. All the members of the Pratishtan experienced the fact that people from different communities and religions voluntarily communicated their wish for eye donation. Today the activists of the Pratishtan create awareness among the people by visiting villages after villages. The activists of the Pratishtan have been partially successful in imbibing the culture: 'Eye donation is the sublime donation'. Instead of burying or cremating, if the dead body can help to kindle the light in the life of blinds, then the act would turn out to be the supreme service to humanity.

This activity has been widely acknowledged on the international level. The Limca Book of World Record took notice of an act of registering the resolution forms in such massive numbers. Shildhi Pratishtan, Shirdi honored the President of Yashwant Pratishtan; Prashant Gadakh by offering the epistle of honor. As an outcome of this mission, Association of Business Communicator took cognizance of the work of eye donation of the Pratishtan and conferred the national level award on Prashant Patil Gadakh, President of *Yashawant Samajik Pratishtan* at the hands of noted European industrialist; Malezin Belt. The award is given for the social work by the Association which comprises of 450 members of different companies like Birla, Goderej, Reliance, TaTa etc. Many industrialists from America, Europe, and Australia along with India were present at the time of the award ceremony. President Prashant Gadakh expressed on the occasion that every activist of the Pratishtan would work for it till the last breath.

• Girl's adoption Scheme.

Ahmednagar District's share in the cooperative movement is large one. There is a great web of the cooperative institutes like cooperative factories, cooperative water distribution societies, cooperative societies etc. The beginner of educational movement, lover of trees and philanthropist for the downtrodden people; Hon'ble Yashwantraoji Gadakh Saheb deserves the following words:

'The small vine planted at the door. The vine scored the sky. Mogra bloomed, Mogra bloomed.'

The president of Mula Education Society; Hon'ble Prashantbhau Gadakh is committed to take care of the society. He established *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* and shouldered the responsibility of educating the poor but studious students of the community by providing the financial assistance and approved the girl's adoption for educational parentage. Girls from the common families are deprived of education due to economical and social reasons. The Pratishtan made attempts to locate such girls who have strong urge for learning from the villages in the vicinity and adopted 52 girls for their completing their education. At present the girls are learning with self respect and content and being the part of the bright future of the country.

• Road Security Abhiyan:

Drive on Road safety was organized by students Welfare Department. The drivers were given the following instructions for safety:

1) Rules for Safety, 2) Drive Slowly, 3) Use of Helmet, 4) Don't use Mobile while Driving.

• Disaster Management

In the aegis with Student's Welfare Department SPP University, Pune the college organized a Two Days workshop on Disaster Management on 11-12 Feb. 2011. Principal Laxman Matkar and Security Officers of Mula Sugar Factory guided on the occasion by citing examples.

The State level workshop on Disaster Management was organized on 29th Feb. to 1st March 2016 at Shanishingnapur. NSS Chief of Maharashtra Dr. Atul Salunkhe, Dr. Mandavkar, Chairman of Disaster Management and Dr. Sanjay Dalvi, Director of NSS, SPP University, Pune guided on the occasion. Total 120 students from different colleges from Maharashtra state participated in the Workshop.

• Adopted Village Morye Chinchore:-

Often we dream that the rich, the businessmen, the film stars or the cricketers must adopt a village and develop the village comprehensively. However the same does not come true. Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan, Sonai in collaboration with the college considered the issue and brought it into practice. Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan adopted a village Morye Chinchore on Sonai – Vambhori road, the village which was notorious at one time for quarrels and was deprived of govt. facilities and finance. But today through the activities like plantation, free library, free hospital, financial assistance for surgery, all diseases diagnosis camp and free medicines, villagers feel the village has acquired its status. Consequently, the Govt. took cognizance of the same and implemented different schemes like tar roads, plantations of 1 lac trees, wild bands and watershed development. With the aegis of S P Pune University, the college arranged winter camp for two consecutive years and accomplished varied types of work. Today people are living in the village contently.

Education for societal progress is the very essence of Institutional vision. Elaborate efforts are made to serve the local community, society and the nation. 5) Basic English Grammar Course

Basic English Grammar Course was conducted from 1st to 15th Feb. 2016 for F.Y.B.A. / B.Com. / B.Sc. students.

6) MPSC Foundation Course:

In order to develop the competitive skills among the students, the college has started the course in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan, Sonai*.

3.7.6 Detail on the systemic efforts of the institution in planning, establishing and implementing the initiatives of the linkages/ collaborations.

The college takes systematic effort in planning, establishing and implementing the initiatives of the linkages / collaborations. The college, considering the potential of the organization and the need of the college, identifies the scope of the collaboration. Then, the responsibility is entrusted to a particular person to establish a rapport between the parties. After the

formal discussion between the parties a MoU/Agreement is signed by the Principal and the organization. Later on, the collaborative activities are organized jointly by the parties. The college has put systematic efforts to establish and implement the initiatives of the linkages / collaborations with other institutes, GOs and NGOs.

- 1. There is a linkage between college and Yashwant Samajik Pratisthan, Sonai to solicit active participation in the social activities run by the Pratisthan like awareness of the 'Eye donation', 'Girls Adoption Scheme', 'A library at every village', 'Cleanliness of Kautiki River', Adopted Village Scheme and 'Road safety Abhiyan'. Accordingly, all faculty members and students of the college have filled in the forms for eye donation.
- 2. There is a MoU of Department of Geography with the Grampanchayats in the college periphery viz. Bramhni, Chanda, Umbare, Dhangarwadi, Karajgaon, etc. for providing the weather data which is collected from the weather station located in the college. The data are handed over through the students which come from above mentioned villages. The weather report is very useful for the farmers. This also helps the students and faculties for their studies and research.
- 3. The college has established linkages/collaborations with industries to help the college to design curriculum, introduce various courses, and to provide opportunities for practical training and job opportunities.
- 4.The college has an active linkage with Jankalyan Blood Bank, Ahmedngar and Lokmanya Blood Bank, Aurangabad. In collaboration with the Blood Bank, the college organizes Free Health Check-up Medical Camps for students to check haemoglobin and calcium. Blood groups of the students are also checked in the camps. For serious problems with students, the concerned parents are immediately communicated.
- 5. There is a MoU with Yash Academy, Sonai for availing coaching to the sports persons of the college. The coaching is free of cost.

Criterion IV Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

Policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure

In order to create and enhance the infrastructural facilities for effective teaching and learning, the policy is framed according to the strength of students in different streams. With the increase in strength of the students, as per requirement, the institution approaches UGC, SPP University, Pune in order to seek financial assistance. The management too actively offers help as and when any infrastructural change is required. The infrastructural enhancement is liberally funded on need base and on the availability of the funds. Some development fund is generated through students' fees. The following issues were considered before formulating policies for infrastructure development:

- Over 100 percent of students come from villages, majority of them are from socioeconomically disadvantaged sections of the society.
- About fifty percent of the students are girls and many of them are first generation learners.
- A large number of students come from geographically disadvantaged areas with meager transport resources.
- Majority of students have to work to support their families either in their own fields or opt for some other marginal jobs.
- Students have no access to advanced technologies for acquisition of knowledge or information. Very few students have their own computers with internet facilities.
- Academically the students are at par with urban students. However, the general awareness regarding career options and employment avenues in rural students is far below than their urban counterparts.
- Rural students' communication skills, body language and confidence level is much below than their urban counterparts.

Taking into consideration the above observations and facts, the college has evolved following policy for the enhancement and creation of infrastructure for facilitating teaching and learning programmes.

- Promote computer literacy among the students by providing infrastructure and training.
- Provide free and open access to internet services.
- Provide e-library for the use of students.
- Improvise the ICT learning resources.

- Upgrade audio visual facilities for interactive learning.
- Construct girls' and boys' hostel to facilitate education to students coming from remote villages.
- Provide better reading room facilities and optimal utilization of library resources.
- Provide facilities within campus to make learning a joyful experience to the students for their all round development.
- Make available better games and sport facilities like swimming pool and indoor stadium.
- Provide need based enrichment programme for better employability like Yashwant study club.
- Make available short term certificate courses for holistic development of students.
- Involve students in research projects competitions like AVISHKAR.
- Conduct courses for personality development and empowering confidence level.
- Counseling of students for career development and job opportunities.
- Make available opportunities for on plant training, field visits and industrial visits.
- Giving impetus to Earn and Learn Scheme for students to support their education.
- Entrepreneurship development through organizing lectures on business and industry.
- Implementing a large number of activities under the Students Welfare Scheme for social development of the students.
- Provide canteen and mess facility for outdoor students.
- Make available language lab to improve communication skill of needy students.

i) Classrooms

The college has 24 fully-ventilated spacious classrooms, 16 equipped laboratories and 6 departments with cabin in Academic building 1, Academic building 2, and Academic building 3, with basic amenities.

All the lecture halls are provided with wooden/steel benches, blackboards and dais with rostrum (platform) and electrical fittings. The lecture halls are provided with large windows for better and efficient access to natural light and air for ventilation and aeration. As a result, none of the class rooms needs electrical lamps and fans during daytime. Total 8 classrooms have LCD projectors. All classrooms and

departments have CCTV camera. All departments and labs have broad band internet connection with computer and printer facility. Other teaching learning facilities include English language laboratory, computer laboratories with net connectivity for students.

ii) Technology Enabled Learning Spaces

Keeping in view the advent of technology in every domain of life, the college is always eager to upgrade its technological front with the inclusion of a few of gadgets to make teaching more modern and highly sophisticated. The college has got ICT laboratory with the provision of internet facility. Two computer labs of the college are spacious and well furnished with 41 computers and 3 printers; electricity backup is available, where the B.B.A., B.B.A. (C.A.) courses are conducted.

All laboratories are well ventilated and provided with necessary infrastructure for fire fighting and safety of the students. Cupboards are made available for storage and handling of instruments. Charts and flow diagrams / sheets, notice boards are fixed in the passage. Computers with internet facilities for the open access to students and staff are provided.

v) Botanical Garden/ Animal House

Land for Botanical garden is provided by Mula Education Society, Sonai.

Similarly, the Animal House (museum) in Zoology Department maintains the store of animals, reptiles, birds and insects in the preserved form, for dissection. Also horses and birds are available at *Ranmala*. At the time of practical examination, animals are arranged for students and regular visits are arranged to *Ranmala*. *Ranmala* is a farm owned by the management where different animals are nurtured.

All the science labs are equipped and required infrastructure is available to make Teaching-Learning effective. The college is also privileged to have computer labs which are equipped with all the IT facilities. The staff is given a free access to internet so that they can enrich their knowledge and then, in turn, the students can benefit from their experiences and knowledge.

All the Departments have been provided with computers, printers and broadband internet connection facilities for carrying out their teaching work most effectively. Staff members who are pursuing research work also get benefited from these facilities.

i) Sports

The institution is well aware of the statement that "Health is Wealth" and there is no denying of the fact that sound health can be achieved by sports. Keeping this in mind, the college is actively involved in the promotion of various games among the students. The college has a Sports Equipment Room, Volleyball Ground, 400 mts track and Kabaddi courts. It consists of a separate two acre sports ground, Indoor stadium and swimming pool.

Ground no-01- 4 x 4 Mts running track, four wheeler, two wheeler and Cycle parking.

Ground no-02-8 x 8 running track, Gents Toilet block, etc.

ii) Outdoor Games:

A spacious 2 acre play ground is available for outdoor games i.e. cricket, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, etc. in college campus. The college students have a free access to the Mula Public school, Sonai for games like Hockey, Athletics and Swimming. For this, the college is having a tie up with the Yash Academy, Sonai.

iii) Indoor Games:

A spacious indoor stadium is available for indoor games like Badminton, Table Tennis, Chess, Carom, Wrestling, etc. These sports equipment are provided to students in the college campus only.

iv) Gymnasium:

The college has well equipped Gymnasium with all the modern state of art equipment.

v) NSS

The college has an NSS unit of 200 students. Total 100 students participate in NSS camp per year. Various socially relevant services are provided by NSS students like blood donation camps, tree plantation, Traffic Control activities, adult education, etc. NSS and *Yashawant Samajik Pratisthan, Sonai* adopted *More Chinchore* (Tal-Newasa, Dist- Ahmednagar) village for its socioeconomic development.

vi) NCC

The college has NCC units of 62 cadets. Students are encouraged to enroll for NCC activities at the beginning of the academic year by sending notices to all classes and displaying on the notice boards. Students are deputed to participate in college level, university level, state level and national level camps. Teachers are motivated to participate in extension activities. On special occasions the programmes like Aids Awareness Rally, Anti-terrorism Rally, Blood Donation camp, Tree Plantation, Trekking Camp, Cycle Rally, Traffic Control activities, General Body Health Checkup, Dental Checkup, Eye Checkup, Skin Checkup and ENT Checkup Camps, Anti Female Foeticide camp, Drug - addiction awareness camp, etc. are organized. Captain Suresh Jadhay, who is working as an Assistant Professor, is incharge of NCC. The students are enrolled for B and C Certificates. It is our pride that 03 cadets of NCC participated in Republic Day parade 2016 at Rajapath, New Delhi. Cadet Miss. Pagire Devayani led the Maharashtra Girls Battalion.

vii) Cultural Activities

The college participates in *Navratri Mohatsav* every year. The college has participated in *Navratra Mohotsav* 2013. Total 10 students (5 boys and 5 girls) participated in 'Jagar' programme and obtained first prize in drama competition. Students also participate in different competitions organized in gathering every year. Students participate in Ganesh festival programme also.

viii) Public Speaking / Communication Skills Development:

The college runs personality development programmes like soft skill development programme, which involve various activities like public speaking and communication development, etc. Besides this, the college faculty keeps on enriching the students with the art of communicative skills. Well equipped Language Lab (Lingua phone) has been setup in the college where the students are involved in extensive communication oriented programmes that are organized on the regular intervals in the college campus by the staff and other visiting faculty. In such rigorous training sessions, the verbal skills and language proficiency of the students are remarkably enhanced and boosted up.

ix) Health and Hygiene, etc.

The college has a very special concern for the health and hygiene of the college students and staff members. For this, the college keeps on organizing health check up camps every year. Proper arrangement of drinking water is available in the college campus at two different locations (R.O. purified drinking water with cooler of capacity 380 liters and 150 liters). Dispensary is available in college campus for treatment of sick students. Hb and blood group checking camps are arranged especially for girl students.

• Optimum Use of infrastructure:

UG and PG classes are run in morning and afternoon shifts respectively. Seminar Hall is used for academic purposes such as meetings, seminars, conferences, workshops, slideshows and demonstrations, etc. Indoor Stadium is used for indoor sports and as gymnasium.

The academic building is also used for running YCMOU, UG and PG classes, career oriented courses and extra coaching classes on holidays. Laboratories are fully utilized for students' practical and research work.

The reprography facility in the central library is made available for the colleges in the Mula education society campus. Internet facility is provided to students.

B.B.A. / B.B.A. (Computer Application) labs are developed with 41-computers, 3- Printers, 4- 1.4 KVA UPS inverters with furniture. The amount spent during last four years is Rs.7,17,000/-.

• Augmentation of Infrastructure:

The Local Management Committee and Internal Quality Assurance Cell play key role in all the planning and execution activities to give impetus to infrastructure development. 

Computers are available for specific use in departments. The teachers liberally take help of the ICT resources to enrich their prescribed curriculum with the help of internet. The college has adequate computer facility for its faculty. Faculty members are provided with computers with internet browsing facility for preparation of teaching / learning materials in their respective departments. In addition, Multimedia LCD projectors and Public address system are available within the college. The college also has seminar hall equipped with projector. Internet facility and Library are kept open to faculty members for learning materials. In addition, the faculty is provided with Audio-Visual aids, which facilitate multimedia teaching.

The faculty members are given training for the use of computers to prepare power point presentation. The access to internet provides enough study material. Power—point presentations are used in the classroom. A well equipped computer Lab, LCD and over head Projectors are available to the faculty for computer aided teaching. Some classrooms have LCD projectors fixed.

Keeping the students' learning at the centre of everything, the college understands that the teachers have to be reoriented from time to time. The times have changed, so has changed the ways of imparting the knowledge. Use of technology has become very vital in imparting quality based education. All the departments in Arts, Commerce and Science faculties have been provided with computers and printers with internet connectivity. Wellequipped computer Labs, LCD and OHPs are available to the faculty for computer-aided teaching. The campus is networked through LAN. The college has 10 Mbps lease line from BSNL for net connectivity. Most of the classrooms provided with LCD projectors. Resources from various websites/web links are used by the teachers for regular teaching learning. Teachers prepare their own Powerpoint presentations and course materials. The computer laboratories are available to students whenever they require. They are given freedom to use the resources and learn through e-resources and e-library. The B.B.A. (C.A.) faculty is always available for any need

based assistance in the use of ICT. The students are encouraged to make use of such facilities available to them.

Yashwant study club has formed Whatsaap group, where academic information is circulated. Syllabi and old question papers have been scanned and softcopies made available on computers in library.

The following counselling services are made available to the students in the college:

- Psycho-social counselling is done through professional cousellors, and general couselling thourgh different committees, personal interactions with the Principal and faculties, etc.
- Specifically academic counselling is done through classroom teaching, parent-students meet, remedial coaching, library services, demonstrations, seminars, projects, workshops, field visits, educational tours, on-site training, etc.

- Counselling for Sports and Cultural activities is mainly undertaken by Gymkhana Committee headed by the Director of Physical Education, Cultural Activities Committee, and special guidance from experts / coaches.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution.

The welfare schemes made available to the students in the college are:

1. Gymkhana and Indoor stadium:

A committee, consisting teacher and Physical Director, manages activities of Gymkhana. The previous year's sports/games champion of the Degree College, if available, will be the secretary. In case of his nonavailability another student whose allround performance during the previous year has been found satisfactory, will be nominated by the Gymkhana Committee as the Secretary. Training and required facilities are provided to the students playing outdoor games viz-Cricket, Volley Ball, Kabaddi, Khokho and Indoor games like Table, Tennis, Badminton, Carom, Chess, etc.

2.Hostel

The college has Boys' hostel and Ladies' hostel in the campus, which accommodates around 192 boys and 290 girls respectively.

3. Botanical Garden

The college is developing an independent and beautiful botanical garden. It is intended to have various plants of rare type which will be instrumental in teaching.

4. Audio-Visual Aids

Audio-Visual aids have paramount of importance in today's fast changing era of communication. The following audio-visual aids are available in the college:

Lingua Phone, O.H.P., Video-cassettes, Educational CD"s, T.V., C.D. Player, V.C.R., Film Projector / Slide Projector, Video-Camera, Laptop Computers, L.C.D. Projectors with screens and Language Improver machines.

5.Laboratory

The Departments of Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Geography and Zoology have their own independent well-equipped laboratories, equipment and chemicals required for the student of U.G. and P.G. classes are available in the laboratories.

6.Literary Associations

Literary Association (Marathi, English, Hindi) has been established with an objective of achieving deep knowledge of these subjects. These associations organize various lectures, workshops and departmental seminars.

7. Science Association and AVISHKAR

In the era of information technology and scientific temper, the study of fundamental science has become very significant. The association organizes various activities, educational trips, etc. These activities are intended to make the teaching learning process more lively and meaningful. AVISHKAR is a research project competition started by the Governor's Office, Govt. of Maharashtra from 2006 to develop the research culture in the minds of students in higher education. Under this programme student from any discipline and class has to choose a subject for his research with the help of his teacher in the college itself.

8. Commerce Association

The association works with an objective of making the teaching and learning of commerce more practical, relevant and comprehensive. The association organizes lectures of the scholars, workshops, seminars, exhibitions, educational trips and commerce festival.

9. Competitive Exam Center:

The competitive center in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratisthan, Sonai* prepares students for various competitive examinations, especially for MPSC, UPSC, LIC and Bank examination by conducting coaching classes. While studying the graduate courses student can appear for examinations. It is conducted in three phases for FY, SY and TY.

10. Vidyarthini Manch:

Special activities for girl students are organized through the formation of interested group with a woman professor in charge. The emphasis has been on themes and issues relevant to girls in particular. As it is the part and parcel of our mission, the focus of interest is to make them self-reliant. The *Manch* organizes guest lecturers too.

11. Yashwantro Chavan Maharashtra Open University Study Center:

The centre has started B.A. and B.Com. courses with a view of providing education to the unprivileged girls, boys and elders. A student aged 16 without S.S.C. or H.S.C. is eligible to seek admission for the courses, if they pass the preadmission test. The M.B.A. course of YCMOU also has been started from the year 2009-2010.

12. National Service Scheme (N.S.S.)

The college has a NSS unit. Students, who are really interested in doing social work, are welcomed to join the college NSS Unit. The actual enrollment however shall depend upon the University guidelines. The intake capacity is 200 for regular activity and 100 students for special camp.

13. National Cadet Corps (NCC)

The college has a separate NCC Unit for boys and girls (62 cadets). All expenses on uniforms, kit, annual training, etc. are borne by the Government. Students are encouraged to join NCC where they get Military Training which enables them to join the army.

14. Students Welfare

This scheme is run from year 2000, under this scheme economically backward student work in various department of the college and garden, such students have given remuneration for their work. For girls under the "Nirbhay Kanya Abiyan" economic support and guidance, for their carrer is given. For poor student under the special guidance cell essential guidance is given.

15. Alumni Association:

Sonai College Alumni Association is an important external appendage of the college. The Executive Committee has the Principal as Chairman. The association is actively involved in different academic and nonacademic programmes. The college invites its alumni to register their details with college office.

16. Students Council:

The students' council is formed in accordance with the provisions of Maharashtra University Act 1994. One of the teachers is designated as working chairman. The Principal is the Ex-Officio Chairman of the Students Council. One of the students of the degree college is elected / nominated as the University Representative.

17. Group Insurance covers for Students:

The college has introduced a Group Insurance to the students. The risk covered includes death, loss of limbs, total / partial / permanent disablement.

18. Computer Centre:

The center conducts a wide range of short term and advanced courses in computer. The college students have an advantage in terms of concessional fee and convenient timing.

19. **Swimming Pool:**

Olympic size Swimming Pool facility along with coaching is available near the college campus on paying nominal fees.

20. Soft Skill Development Programme:

The programme of personality development in the era of LPG (Liberalization, Privatization and Globalization) has much more importance. The student from rural sector may not compete without this. The skills are imparted to the students through this programme which are commonly important. This programme is run under the aegis of SPP University, Pune from 2007.

21. Placement Cell:

The career guidance and counseling for preparation of competitive examinations, subsequently campus interviews are arranged and students are provided placements through this cell.

• NCC

The feedback from these representatives is sought during the meetings. The suggestions made by the graduates and employers are placed before the different administrative bodies for consideration and to take decisions.

For example, as per the demand from the graduates, M.Sc. (Org. Chem.) course was introduced. In the light of the suggestions made by the industrialists and professionals, the proposal for B.Voc. programmes was

sent to UGC for financial assistance. As per the demand from the graduates of B.B.A. (Computer Application) students, the college has developed a new computer laboratory with 40 computers. Considering the suggestions from the sports persons from the wrestling events, the college has purchased wrestling mats.

Yes. The college involves and encourages the students to publish materials in:

- The college publishes a magazine called "Saraswat" which is a joint venture of college professor and student. It is furnished with different kinds of essay, articles with literary value, critical and important evaluation on various event, poems and reports.
- Student's writing also published in the form of wallpaper "Saraswat" published twice in an academic year.
- The college also organizes essay competition.
- Poster presentation on various current issues, also done by the respective departments.
- The college central library organizes book exhibition on various occasions.
- Village survey and tour summary writing carried out by the students of History department.
- The college annual magazine "Saraswat" was subjected for the university competition.
- Our four students have been appointed as chief editor, editor, sub-editor and journalists in the popular newspaper.

5.3.5 Does the college have a student council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes. The college has a Student' Council as per the Maharashtra University Act 1994. The council has 79 members out of which 31 are selected. The remaining 6 members are selected on merit basis to represent NSS, NCC, Cultural, and Sports, and two girls' representatives are nominated by the Principal. Out of the six, two are from the reserved category. The student members of the Students' Council elect their General Secretary, and he / she represents the college in the University Students' Council.

During the academic year, the Students' Council meets at least three to four times. In these meetings, the members are informed about the academic as well as extra-curricular activities to be carried out and are carried out with their support. This enables to maintain discipline and smooth functioning of the college.

There is no separate provision of funding to the Students' Council. However, the college provides TA and DA for attending meetings outside. If there are

some demands / suggestions from the students, they are discussed and satisfied.

Election of YIN

During this academic year, the college and the Daily Sakal Media Group's initiative Young Inspirators Network (YIN) conducted the polling for the college youths during 15th to 30th Dec. 2016 in the state. The YIN leaders working in our college were chosen as leaders on account of their good works. In the college, this activity was carried out. The students of the college voted for their favorite leaders to be selected for this election. Total 358 students participated in this programme. Two students (1 Boy and 1 Girl) were elected from this activity.

Daily Sakal Group's Tanishka

During the academic year 2016-17, the college and Daily Sakal Group conducted Tanishka Leadership Development Programme. The students of the college participated in the election through mobile missed call and voting by ballet. Smt. academic year, the information about the college and its ideals are also communicated to newly admitted students through orientation programme (s) and Principal's address. The vision, mission and objectives of the institution are communicated to parents and students through the online prospectus of the college.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The college is governed by the Mula Education Society. The office of MES and the college are on the same campus. This physical proximity provides convenience for the top management, Principal and the faculty to work together for the implementation of quality policy and plans.

The management provides the roadmap and general guidelines for quality policy in order to create conducive learning environment and preserve the ethos of academic excellence set up by the college. The 'Local Managing Committee' (LMC) consisting of representatives from management, teaching and non-teaching staff along with the Principal is committed for effective governance. The LMC guides in planning, monitoring and evaluating mechanisms regarding administrative and academic processes as per Maharashtra Universities Act, 1994. IQAC provides facilitative and participative voluntary system for the sustenance of quality and enhancement measures. The Principal is the ex-officio chairman of IQAC and plays a significant role in ensuring proper communication and networking with the stakeholders. At the beginning of each academic year, IQAC prepares the plan for all the educational activities i.e. 'Academic and activity calendar, teacher's diary' by consulting the heads of Arts, Commerce and Science as well as LMC.

The faculty is actively involved in decision making process through the 'Departmental Committees'. Departmental committees are given responsibility to take all the necessary steps for successful implementation of the academic / activity plan and submit the report on the action taken every term for 'Academic Audit'. At the end of every academic year, every department submits the 'Annual departmental activity report' to the Principal; which is then published in the annual college magazine 'Sarswat'.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

* The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission

The Principal, as a leader of the college, conducts a meeting of all faculty members at the beginning of the academic year. The academic calendar is prepared under the guidance of the Principal in consultation with the Heads of the departments. The different committees are formed for smooth functioning of the college. Continuous improvement in the academic process is ensured through participation and organization of seminars / conferences / workshops, motivating the faculty to undertake MRPs,

development in infrastructure, guiding the students to participate in various activities.

Formulation of the action plans for all operations and incorporation is decided in the year end meeting. The Principal forms various committees at the beginning of every academic year. All the departments and committees prepare their action plan along with the academic calendar, which is to be implemented. If a new course is to be started, its proposal is submitted in the previous year and required infrastructure is made available. The Principal monitors the progress of the action plan. For proper implementation, the views of faculty members, student representatives, parents, and other stakeholders are taken into consideration.

* Interaction with stakeholders

The Principal makes conscious efforts to build a healthy relationship with its stakeholders.

Students:

The Principal holds frequent meetings with the Students' Council to understand their problems and to interact with them, as per requirement. In the beginning of every academic year, the Principal addresses the Part-I students to introduce the college. He also encourages the students to participate in various activities, competitions, sports, NSS and NCC. A suggestion box is placed in the college building, and after analyzing the suggestions of the students, a proper action is taken by the Principal. Various Committees are formed for the benefit of the students. Even the students can directly interact with the Principal. The students are felicitated in annual college prize distribution function.

Alumni:

There is an active Alumni Association of the college. Every year, two meetings of the association are conducted. Some alumni serving in the college are bridge between the alumni and the Principal. The Principal considers the suggestions from the alumni for amplifying the overall college development.

Parents:

Parent-teacher meets are organized by the college twice a year to communicate their wards' performance and to understand their views regarding the progress of their wards and college. The parents' suggestions are always welcomed for the development of the students and institution. Parents can directly interact with the Principal and teachers whenever they want.

Teaching and Non-teaching staff:

Our leadership promotes a culture of excellence at every level. Faculty Development Workshops and Guest lectures are organized with the guidance of the Principal, to keep the faculty and students abreast of the recent trends in teaching, learning and evaluation, and their specialized area of interest, thereby reinforcing a culture of excellence. As an institution moving towards paperless governance, most of the communications are sent to the Departments and Centers through e-mail and SMS. The college website is updated with recent information, whenever necessary.

* Champion organizational change.

Leadership is always vigilant in observing the changes in the global academic scenario, updating the programmes and facilities accordingly. Commencement of new courses, research activities, use of computer and internet facilities, ICT enabled class room teaching are the some of the examples. Changes in the existing rules and regulations are brought about after a thorough discussion in the LMC based on the needs of the present

generation. The COCs have been introduced in the college taking into consideration the recent interests of the stakeholders.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- The institution monitors the effective implementation of plans through IQAC and periodic review meetings and interaction with the students.
- Academic planning of teaching and academic calendar of various programmes is prepared annually.
- Principal, Vice principal and H.O.Ds monitor all the activities on daily basis and through IQAC.
- Periodic review of all these committees is practically done and expected target is achieved.
- The regular feedback mechanism is implemented, systematically monitored in the existing system and this ensures efficiency of performance of every teacher of the institution.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top management has given freedom to the Principal and the faculty to develop the academic leadership. The faculty is given a free hand to work as conveners, coordinators, secretary or members of the organizing committees of various academic events organized by the college. Teachers can also work on various academic bodies in the university or government / nongovernment organizations. The Heads of departments are given freedom to administer their respective departments, plan and execute academic programmes. Classwise In-Charges and Post Graduate Programme Coordinators are appointed to facilitate smooth conduct of academic activities throughout the year and monitor the overall progress of the students. There are Departmental Committees to take all the necessary steps for successful implementation of the academic plan and provide the feedback to faculty incharge. The faculty members are allowed to participate in and contribute to the deliberations. In addition to the above, there are Advisory Committees for Self Financing Programmes, comprising of Members of the Management and teachers, which help in planning the academic activities.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

Student Leadership:

The student leadership is mainly groomed through the Students' Council of the college. The NSS, NCC and Sports departments of the college provide ample opportunities in grooming leadership. The programmes organized by these departments empower the students with the leadership qualities. The students are also encouraged to participate in the university, state, regional

level competitions like quiz, elocution, debate, youth festival, etc. in which their leadership qualities are developed.

Faculty Leadership:

The management always encourages the involvement of the faculty in the quality assurance and enhancement process of the institution. Various members are involved in the academic and administrative committees of the college such as Building Committee, Advisory Committee, Discipline Committee, Examination Committee, Library Committee, Academic and Research Coordination Committee, etc. by the Principal. All committees are constituted with a judicious combination of young talent and experienced members so that the younger faculty can learn the ethos and work culture of the college as the prospective leaders.

Training Programmes:

The Principal, administrative staff and coordinators of various committees are encouraged to participate in leadership training programmes organized by the state, national and international organizations. The faculty members are motivated to organize different programmes through which the leadership qualities are developed.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Principal as a head of the institution provides complete autonomy to the heads of the department in planning and implementation of the teaching and learning plans, research, extracurricular and extension activities. The budgetary provisions are made as per the requirement of each department. Autonomy is provided for proper utilization of allotted budget to head of the department. The amount allotted utilized at the priority basis with the approval of purchase committee. Each department of the college is given operational autonomy. Head of the department has functional freedom. He allocates the workload, timetable, conduction of test, seminars, etc. under the guidelines given by the principal and the university.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the college is committed to a culture of participative management. The Principal, Vice-Principal, Office Superintendent and IQAC coordinator are responsible for academic and administrative leadership of the college.

The Principal meets twice in a month with Heads of departments and Vice Principals to discuss academic or administrative issues. The IQAC meets periodically to discuss the points related to the quality policy and plans. The apex decision making body at College level is the Local Managing Committee (LMC) of Mula Education Society. The LMC has representatives from teaching as well as non-teaching staff. All the issues regarding

academics, administration and enhancement of infrastructure, sanctioning of sabbatical / study leave, etc. are decided by the LMC.

The IQAC also includes faculty members along with members from the society for the policy / plan formulation and its implementation. Faculty members from IQAC play an active role in the management of academic activities of the college. Students actively participate in various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Faculty members participate in the management process through the LMC. The stakeholders are given highlights of the achievements and activities during the annual general meeting of MES.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

- Yes, the quality policy of the institution reflects in its vision and mission. The prime aim is the satisfaction of its stakeholders.

- Various strategies are further adopted and extended for implementation at the specific local level of the college.
- Excellence at all levels is a prime concern. Various programmes are designed to augment quality in teaching learning process. It involves planned teaching, transparent evaluation, regular reviews of result patterns and taking remedial action at the individual and group levels. The same applies to excellence in sports and extracurricular activities.


There is a separate local managing committee for the college, consisting of the following members:

The committee meets twice a year and provides suggestion on policies and programmes for overall academic and administarive matters of the institution. The internal organization structure of the institution is as follow:

- Feedback collected through structured proforma and suggestion box to seek information and to take necessary measures for quality improvement.
- During the frequent visits of the office bearers of the top management, the Principal provides necessary information to review the activities of the college.
- The college gives wide publicity to the activities through media, the college annual magazine *Saraswat* and the college website.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

- Involvement of staff in improving effectiveness and efficiencies of the Institution:
 - The management encourages and supports total involvement of its staff in campus life and activities.
 - Staff meetings are conducted with management and valuable ideas are shared.
 - Best teacher award by the Mula Education Society, Sonai encourages illustrious personnel.
 - High level of decentralization is facilitated through the delegation of powers through various committees that execute academic and extracurricular activities.
 - IQAC meets regularly to take review of quality issues.
 - Coordinators of various programmes and departments plan and execute smooth functioning of their activities.
 - Active participation of faculty for improving the efficiency of the institution in various programmes like Republic Day celebration, Independence Day celebration, Sports festival, *Navratra Mahotsav*, Various day celebration, and programmes on birth and death anniversaries of national heroes.
 - For positive reinforcement the awards and recognition offered and motivate the teacher.
 - The management ensures participation of the staff in major Institutional processes by involving them in activities such as preparing prospective and strategic plans by giving representation in:
 - 1. Governing council and Local Managing Committee.
 - 2. Co- ordination of academic and co-curricular activities.
 - 3. The admission process of the students.
 - 4. The recruitment of the faculty

- 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes.

The affiliating university makes provision for the status of autonomy to affiliated institutions. The college has not initiated the process to obtain autonomy.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institute has a Grievance Redressal Cell headed by the Principal to address and redress the grievances. The Grievances Redressal Committee constituted for the overall well-being is doing prompt and effective disposal of grievances of various stakeholders, staff and students. This committee discusses the matter with the Principal to solve the problems. There is no such kind of major instant in the last four years.

The LMC, Students' Council, Discipline Committee, Committee against Sexual Harassment and Anti-ragging Committee also look after overall discipline of the college and resolve complaints, if any. If there is any serious complaint against the faculty or staff, it is referred to the management for further action. However, there has been no instance of such cases.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

There has been no instance of court case filed by or against the institute in the last four years.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

• Students' feedback and academic audit:

Yes, college has mechanism for analyzing student feedback on Institutional performance. The systematic feedback is obtained from students and analyzed as per ACA-R-45-A, ACA-R-45-B and ACA-R-46 and concerned faculty is given a letter for improvement as per ACA-R-47 (As per ISO 9001: 2008 academic manual).

• Outcome of Feedback:

- a) There was a demand from the P.G. students for additional reference books, so the books are made available in the college library.
- b) Internet (10 Mbps lease line) connectivity, reading room facility in the evening and reprography facilities are provided to the students in the college library as per their demand.
- c) Modern public address system and classroom address system are made available to the students as per their demand.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The Institution has been taking concerted efforts to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff.

- Newly recruited members of faculty are urged to undergo mandatory Orientation, Refresher courses and Short Term Course through the Academic Staff College.
- Travel grants for International conferences provided to faculty who are invited to present their research papers.
- The aim of the Institution is to make the faculty internationally competent. Travel support and On Duty Leave are provided liberally to facilitate faculty participation in International and National Conferences, Symposia, etc. Faculty members are encouraged to undergo summer training and to attend specialized workshops for capacity building in their respective areas of specialization.
- The college also organizes Soft Skill Workshop for Faculty Members. Non Teaching staff in the institution is also encouraged from time to time to attend various courses to enhance their capacity. For example ICT training, Communications Skills, etc.
- They are also encouraged to pursue the courses offered by the Institute of Distance Education, Some Non teaching staff members completed their PG.
- All administrative staff is encouraged to qualify for a computer diploma and those already employed are facilitated to acquire computer diplomas / advanced computer training.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The strategies adopted by the college are as follows:

- Orientation of new recruits
- Workshop on funding agencies and how to write a research proposal
- Faculty development programmes for teachers on specific areas
- For better teaching performance our faculty attended refresher and orientation courses.
- For subject expertise and to inculcate research capacity our faculty organizes and attends various conferences, workshop, symposia and seminars.
- For administrative purpose the institution provides co-officers for examinations, organize administrative workshops and training programmes for teaching and non teaching staff.

The college has perceived the need for enabling its faculty to use ICT tools to create richer learning environment and also improve curriculum delivery. The teaching and non-teaching staff is given training of ICT. The workshops on the newly framed syllabi of SPP University, Pune are arranged and the faculty members are also encouraged to actively participate in such workshops. The faculties are motivated to organize and attend workshops / seminars / conferences, etc. and they are also motivated to participate in the staff academic programmes. The college motivates the faculty members to undertake examination works of SPP University, Pune. The senior members are given responsibilities as HODs, coordinators and conveners of different committees, CAP Chairman, etc. Training on use of salary software for office staff has been given.

Every year the college organizes at least 2 national / state level seminars / conferences. Special financial assistance is given for the paper presenters in the seminars / conferences. So far, 2 major and 24 minor research projects (MRPs) have been undertaken during last five years.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The college follows the 'Performance Based Assessment System' (PBAS) of UGC as prescribed in its regulations of June 2010. The university has developed an 'Academic Performance Indicator' (API) system which is based on PBAS System developed by the UGC.

The college IQAC addresses all the issues related to appraisal system of the staff, regularly evaluates it, and then forwards it to the University authorities for final validation of API Scores.

As per clause no. 6.1.0 of UGC regulation 30th June 2010 API is calculated for the Teaching Staff.

At the beginning of the academic year, every teacher submits his / her duly filled PBAS+API along with supporting documents to the IQAC. The IQAC scrutinizes and assigns scores under various categories. These scores are compiled and presented to the University authorities at the time of its validation under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

The IQAC of the college has developed a well-defined mechanism for collecting this information, scrutinizing it and storing it. It also acts as a guidance cell for all queries regarding the API system.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The outcome of the review of PBAS+API for all teachers leads to a better understanding of

- a. Role of a teacher and his / her contribution to the development of the Institution / College.
- b.Use of teaching methods / methodology followed in the teaching, aids used in teaching, quality of course material and conduct of lectures and practicals (term wise).
- c.It also focuses on the research caliber of the teacher, which is evident through types and number of research projects, quality of research publications / patents, etc. In addition, the heads of the department fill up the confidential report of every faculty member and forward it to the Principal. The Principal authenticates the report and forwards it for necessary action in case of poor performance. A final report on the appraisal process for each teacher is communicated to the Principal / Management who jointly take a decision on whether the case has to be forwarded to the university or withheld under Career Advancement Scheme.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

- The college provides Group Insurance Scheme and 100% of the teaching and non-teaching staff are covered under this scheme.
- The Teaching and Non teaching staff formed a credit cooperative society which provides House, Vehicle and Consumer Goods Loan up to 8 lac. Also provision of emergency loan up to Rs.20000/-.
- The Mula Central Cooperative Consumer Society (Mula Bazar) provides Food grains, House hold appliances on EMI / Credit basis.
- The college also have health care unit which provides periodic medical checkup and facilities.
- The class IV employees are given free uniforms.

- Free computer literacy and training for non-teaching staff.
- Encourage supporting staff to participate in intercollegiate sports and cultural activities.
- TA / DA is provided to attain meeting to non teaching staff.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The vacancies are advertised in the national and local level news paper as well as on the MES website. The college has a well-defined recruitment policy within the framework of the UGC and State Government norms. For self-financed programmes well-qualified and meritorious faculty are recruited and retained by paying salaries as per UGC scale. Retaining the faculty members is never a problem for the management due to the MES / ACS family relationship. All the faculty members are given academic autonomy. The ambience, vibrant student population, work culture, freedom, the opportunity to explore, good academic and research infrastructure are some of the distinctive characteristics of the college. The college recognizes individual achievements or contributions and provides all the support and motivation needed for them to develop further.

The welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff are:

- Financial assistance / loans for various reasons by the credit cooperative society of the employees of the management.
- Felicitation by the management for achievements of the employees and their wards.
- Free computer awareness training for the employees.
- Deputation of faculties and staff for competence building Programmes / FIP.
- In emergency, advance is given to the teaching and non teaching staff.
- Fund raising drive for the employee affected by an unforeseen calamity.
- Share of the EPF is borne by the college.
- Group life insurance for teaching and non teaching staff.

The benefits of these schemes are availed by almost all eligible employees.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources?

- Available financial resources to the institution are government aid (salary grants), scholarship grants from social welfare department of government, like GOI freeships and scholarship, free ships to the wards of exservicemen, primary and secondary school teachers, and UGC grants under various schemes. Other financial resources are the fees collected from students for the self finance courses.
- The Principal is the authority for monitoring and controlling all the financial and transactional procedures. Head of each department submits

requirements for chemicals and consumable, stationery, equipment, books, maintenance work and repair works at the end of every academic year. Based on these requirements and that received from other stakeholders, annual budget plan is drafted.

- All purchases are made by Mula Education Society, Sonai.
- 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Yes.

The accounts are audited regularly. The procedure of auditing accounts is as follows:

- The cash book is prepared daily by the Accountant, checked by Office Superintendent and verified and signed by the Principal.
- The external auditor verifies the cash book, ledger books, fees, vouchers, stock book, dead stock register and other documents related with accounts of the college. After verification of books of accounts, auditor prepares trial balance and receipt-payments. Every year, the audited accounts are submitted to the Joint Director's Office, Higher Education on or before 31st July.
- The accounts are audited regularly by the registered Chartered Accountant, Sherkar and Co., Aurangabad, who is appointed by general body of MES.
- 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts / funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of the institutional receipts are the salary grants received from the State Government, the fees collected from the students under various heads as prescribed by the SPP University, Pune, the fees received from the self-financing courses, the grants from funding agencies like UGC, BCUD, etc. and to minimal extent the sponsorships for various activities of the college. Amount against deficit is procured as advance from MES.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

Apart from the regular sources of income, the college explores alternative sources of additional funding. The college IQAC plays a proactive role in writing proposals for funding to various agencies under different schemes.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes,

IQAC has been actively functioning in the college since 17th July 2008. The college has entrusted the responsibility of planning, monitoring and executing different activities to the IQAC for quality assurance and sustenance focusing on the core values identified by the NAAC.

The quality assurance processes have been institutionalized through:

- Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher education
- Reviewing the existing programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario
- Promoting research and creating atmosphere conducive to research
- Promoting the use of technology for enhanced teaching learning process
- Organization of national, state, regional level seminars / conferences / workshops
- Inculcating nationalistic / patriotic sentiments
- Imparting value based education
- Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes/activities of the college

 Collecting the feedback responses from the students, parents and other stakeholders.

The IQAC prepares an AQAR report of the college and is submitted to NAAC every year.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The management approved 16 decisions of the IQAC. Out of which 16 were actually implemented.

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes,

The IQAC has external members on its committee. They are from the fields of academics and industry. Accordingly, the college has formed MoU's and arranged programmes like Student and Faculty Exchange Programme, industrial tours, on-site traing programmes, etc.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The students and alumni coming from all strata of society contribute to the functioning of IQAC with their valuable suggestions made during their interactions with the Principal and Coordinator of the IQAC. They give active support to implement the decisions taken by the IQAC. As a mark of respect and gratitude, they render valuable services to the college.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC communicates the staff through notices, messages, e-mails, and various meetings conducted from time to time. The IQAC meetings are conducted for planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures and the decisions taken are communicated to the staff and students for effective execution. Proper human resource is identified to shoulder different responsibilities. Various committees of teachers and staff provide assistance to the IQAC. In this way, the IQAC engages the staff from different constituents of the college for its efficient functioning.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If yes, give details on its operationalization.

Yes, the college has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The IQAC plays a major role in quality assurance in the college. The quality measures are decided in the meeting of the IQAC organized in the end of the previous year and implemented accordingly throughout the next academic year. For the effective functioning of academic and administrative activities, various committees are constituted in the beginning of the academic year to implement the quality measures decided by the IQAC. For the quality assurance and sustenance, the academic and event calendars are published before the commencement of the academic year. The faculties maintain academic diaries to record their academic, co-curricular, extracurricular and extension activities. The Principal takes review of the implementation of the activities in the meetings with the faculty and non-teaching staff as well as in personal interactions with the staff, whenever necessary.

The college has a work culture of working beyond the working hours. Our belief is that our college is a family called Mula Udyog Parivar / Yash Group which motivates us to work as a team. The management has also institutionalized the internal Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) of the college by the panel of peers to ensure quality assurance and sustenance.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Yes.

The college provides training to its staff for quality assurance procedures. Institutional level workshops, lectures by eminent speakers and awareness programmes are organized by the college. For competence building, the college conducts training programmes like use of software, and ICT for the staff. They are also deputed for the training in accounts and other related matters. The college has oraganized one day workshop on office empowerment on 18/03/2016. Total 45 admins participated in the workshop. The college carried out the process of ISO 9001:2008 certification for quality assurance.

The impact of these measures is reflected in improved efficiency, and prompt and quality services of administrative staff.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes.

The college IQAC undertakes academic audit at the end of each term. External academic audits are done by agencies like LIC of University, ISO 9001: 2008, Joint Director, Higher Education (Grants), Pune.

All these outcomes are thoroughly assessed by the college and IQAC and the shortcomings are addressed in a systematic manner. These audits have helped in improving our academic and administrative processes (with regard to teachers' appraisal, student activities, addition of equipment, books and journals, infrastructure, etc.).

6.5.5 How is the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies / regulatory authorities?

ISO quality manual has been prepared in accordance with the clauses of the ISO 9001: 2008. These quality manual are:

- 1. Academic manual
- 2. Admin manual
- 3. Physical director manual
- 4. Library manual

Accordingly, non-conformities of manuals are complied and these are resolved regularly. The ISO Committee has visited and confirmed the manual report.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- To assess the performance of teachers, feedback is collected from students, it is carefully analyzed. Through personal meeting, concerned teacher is guided by the Principal for necessary improvements.
- The performance of students is assessed through class tests, tutorials and seminars as part of their internal assessment guidelines laid by the University as also by the semester exams of the University.
- Field visits, Industry visits and Study tours are regularly organized for students.
- Attendance of students taken for every theory and practical classes.
 Through regular attendance and CCTV network, quality of teaching and learning is constantly monitored and necessary measures are taken for improvement.
- The Principal reviews frequently the overall teaching learning mechanisms. He gives necessary instructions to the concerned teachers for improvements.
- Training courses are provided to the faculty
- ICT enabled teaching is improved substantially.

The following steps are taken by the institution to review teaching learning process:

- a. Preparation of Academic and Activity Calendar
- b. Preparation and execution of teaching plan
- c. Calculation of number of lectures / practicals available in each term for effective delivery of course content.
- d. Periodic review of syllabus in departmental meetings.
- e. Scrutiny and assigning of API scores at the end of each academic year.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The college communicates its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcome to the various internal and external stakeholders through the college website, digital display boards, the college prospectus, formal meetings and personal interactions with the stakeholders, notices, reports of activities in college annual *Saraswat*, print and electronic media, and addresses in the college activities / programmes.

Criterion VII Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes,

- 1. The college has conducted environmental / green campus of its campus and facilities. The environmental audit of the campus has been carried out as per government guidelines by Environment Action for Sustainable Transformation, Kothrud, Pune.
- 2. The Department of Botany has completely surveyed the flora of the campus, and named numbered the plants and trees.
- 3. Mula Education Society performs tree plantation annually.
- 4. The plantation programme was executed by NSS and EARN and LEARN units regularly.
- 5. Maintenance of all greenery of the college has been outsourced.
- 6. The Department of Zoology maintains faunal diversity in college, especially in Ranmala.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

• Energy conservation

- Use of LED Lights
- In non-reading and non-working area reduced lighting is used.
- Lights are switched off immediately when not required.
- All gadgets, computers and other electrical equipment are closed down at the end of the day.
- Faculty members and admin are notified to ensure that fans and lights should not run in unoccupied classrooms and laboratories.

• Use of Renewable Energy

- Solar energy devices are effectively used for conservation of energy. Solar water heaters are installed in Girls' and Boys' Hostel.
- The college has installed solar lamps in the campus.

• Water Harvesting

The rain water from Vidnyan Bhavan is harvested by collecting it in the well side by. The grounds of the college are leveled so that the rain water is collected in the beds side by.

• Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

Tree plantation has been carried out by NSS, NCC and Earn and Learn scheme students to maintain carbon neutrality. Environmental Assessment has been conducted in the college campus by Environment Action for Sustainable Transformation, Kothrud, Pune. The assessment report shows that the college is enriched by the diversity of trees. The college campus is far away from the hazardous urban pollution. LPG fuel is used in the laboratories. Vehicle free day is observed once in a year when students and teachers reach the college without using the vehicles.

• Plantation

The founder president of the Mula Education Society, Hon'ble Yashwantrao Gadakh Patil envisaged the greenery of the college, as a result a number of drives have been carried out since the establishment of the college in order to increase the trees in the campus. The greenery of the college is so rich that one may experience Kokon belt in the college campus. NSS and NCC and Earn and Learn scheme students maintain the plantation. The special care is taken by availing gardening by outsource.

• Hazardous Waste Management

Waste chemicals of laboratory are deposed by releasing it in the soak pit in the protected zone. Exhaust fans and Fire extinguisher are installed in the laboratories to exhaust the harmful gases. Slogans and notices are displayed at different places to avoid the misuse of apparatus.

• E-waste Management

Different electronic items like CDs, out dated computers, empty toners and unused printers are handed over to store room in the Mula Education Society Campus.

• Others:

1. Vermi Compost Unit:

The college has a vermin compost unit where all dry leaves and the food waste is converted into organic compost. The compost is used for growing different plants in the college campus.

2.Prevention of sound pollution:

To avoid noise pollution in the college campus, no horn slogan boards and symbols are displayed at the parking and other areas.

7.2 Innovations

- 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.
 - A. The college has introduced the following innovative practices which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

• Online Admissions and Cashless Office:

Online admissions and cashless office is one of the first initiatives, which have exerted positive impact on its functioning. The college introduced it even earlier to that of SPP University, Pune and UGC circulars. It has resulted in hassle free transactions.

• Academic and Administrative Audit:

The college has volunteered twice for Academic and Administrative Audit of the college through evaluation by SPP University, Pune for the Best College Award in the academic years 2012-13 and 2014-15.

• Gender Sensitization programme:

The college has organized a number of programmes on gender sensitization like social surveys, Rally against female feticide and dowry, *Jagar Janivnacha*, *Nirbhay Kanya Abhiyan*, Guest lectures of Eminent ladies especially for girls through NSS, NCC and *Vidhyrthini Munch*.

• Soft Skill Development Programme:

In the aegis with SPP University, Pune the college arranges Soft Skill Development Programme (SSDP) for the third year students. SSDPs are separately arranged for Arts, Commerce and Science Faculties. The students are taught / trained on the topics like: SWOT Analysis, Yoga, transaction analysis, presentation skills, communication Skills, Interview technique, Goal setting, Meditation, the use of language improver machine. Certificates are distributed after successful completion of the programme.

• The guidance for research work to Students:

Most of the senior faculty members of the college have visited countries like Nepal, South Africa, Thailand and Shri Lanka and have presented their research papers in the international seminars/conferences. However, it was found that the students of the college are bereaved of the research findings of their teachers who have presented articles overseas. Taking this into consideration seminars of the teachers who presented research papers overseas were arranged on 20th Sept. 2014. It was a concurrent session and students were given the flexibility to attend the presentation on their choice irrespective of subject or faculty obligation. This helped the students to attend the presentation at par with their interests. 10 such teachers presented their articles with LCD Projectors and narrated their experiences at abroad. This programme has produced the positive impact on the students who attended the seminars wholeheartedly.

• Digital Notice Board, Automatic Weather Station:

As one of the ICT initiatives, the college has installed Digital Notice Board, Automatic Weather Station.

Notices, circulars and exam schedule are displayed on the digital notice board. This helps the students to attend classes punctually, to submit testimonials in time and to know about curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular events.

Installation of Automatic Weather Station helps students know about direction and speed of the wind, temperature and humidity. The information is displayed at different villages for the farmers' perusal.

Different kind of academic information is shared through WhatsApp group of the employee of the college.

• Saraswat Magazine:

The college annually publishes the magazine, Saraswat to give the opportunity to scholars / students' budding talents. It contents Marathi, Hindi and English sections. Poetry, articles and essays of the students are published after peer scrutiny. It also contains reports of departmental activities and programme conducted during the year. It also communicates achievements of students and the faculty members.

• Sonai Mini Marathon:

Sonai mini Marathon is arranged on the occasion of *Sonai Mahotsav*. Runners belonging to different age groups participate in the marathon and run for the distance of 10 km. Physical Director of the college prepares all the arrangements of the Marathon and works as referee.

• Smiley Balbhavan Sonai:

Smiley Balbhavan is a school run by Sharadatai Foundation for the upliftment of children in slum area, of the ages ranging from 4 yrs to 10 yrs. In free hours the students of the college visited the school and taught the children in slum area as a part of social commitment as follows:

B. The college has formed MoU with Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan, Sonai for arranging a number of social crusades as follows:

• Sonai Ratna Award:

The society is comprised of many such people who magnanimously work for the society day and night and who take hold view of the village as a family. It is a tradition of *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* and *Jagdamba Devi* Temple Trust to confer Sonai Ratna Award on such hard workers and honest villagers by considering their spiritual, social,

and academic works. The first recipient of the award was Mr. Mehboob Sayyed. In the last 30 / 31 years, the brakeless recitation for a week of the name of *Hari*; the God, known as *Akhand Harinam Saptah*, has been continued since 1984. The Sonai Ratna Award has been conferred on many such activists such as *Saraswati Sabre* for her work in health services, Late Kankarao Gadakh Guruji for his work in education, Shri. Champalal Changedia for his work in trade growth, Late Macchindradada Yelwande for his religious work, Vishwanath Dhale for his social work. The *Sonai Ratna* Award is conferred by the law of '*Sarv Dharm Sam Bhav*'; equality of all religions. The criteria of honesty, conduct and works are applied transparently for the selection.

• Yashwant Study Club:

The competitive guidance was started by *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* in collaboration with the college under the presidency of Hon'ble Yashwantraoji Gadakh by facilitating the perfect open library in the proximity of natural beauty of Mula Education Society Campus, consequently the rural students need not go in the city in search of guidance. Required expertise of the college is utilized for teaching the contents of competitive exams. Today many students of the college have enrolled in the examination centre and have started appearing for the competitive exams such as MPSC, UPSC and other examinations.

• Yashwant Library:

Hon'ble Yashwantrao Gadakh Saheb is a sensitive reader and a sensitive author. He always felt that the rural children must learn and become great persons and for that, reading culture must be enhanced. The interest in reading is deteriorating with the advances in physical facilities in the era of science. Eventually Yashwant Library was started for inculcating the reading habits amongst the youths. Hon'ble Yashwantraoji Gadakh donated 3000 books.

• Mahila Swayam Sahayata Bachat Gats (Women Self Help Saving Groups):

Women are supposed to be the wheels of the family chariot. Today women are educated; they can understand the transactions and shoulder to shoulder with men can work out the financial matters. Women are more practical if compared with men. With this motive, *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* raised the movement of Women Self Help Saving Groups in Newasa taluka. One perfect movement of Women Self Help Saving Groups was raised consisting 1720 Groups. Without pause, the movement led into the loan disbursement of Rs.16 crore to saving groups and availed the subsidy of amount Rs. 2 crore in Newasa taluka in collaboration of *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* and

Shardatai Foundation, Sonai. The resolution was passed to avail the loan on 0 % interest. Today women have become self-reliant and have dominated the financial sectors of the society as their purses are full of money. The faculty and students of the college provide different kinds of assistance to the Women Self Help Saving Groups like providing guidance on how to write minutes of the meetings or how to keep records.

• Beautification of the Kautiki River:

Splendor of any town is enhanced by its river that flows by. The river *Kautiki* is very closely associated with the lives of Sonaietes and it preserves the typical ambience of the village. The breadth of the river, the murmuring water and the traders on its bank were the glimpses of the river. *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* made endeavors to restore the six decades old glory of the river. The efforts were made for beautification with plantation at the hands of 11 women, 11 youths and senior citizens. Refreshening ambience was sought by renovating archaic well, small well, cleaning of the breadth of the river and implanting benches. Consequently, children play on the side by grounds in the midst of twittering of the birds in the trees. Beautification of Kautiki River has been carried out by NSS, NCC and Earn and Learn scheme students along with staff of the college.

• A Visit to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune:

The students always fancy about the university from where they get their education. The students hope for the opportunity to sightsee the university. *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* organized such event / activity in collaboration with the college as never before in the history of SPP University, Pune on 08/08/2013. Prashant Patil Gadakh initiated the efforts to tour the students of 126 colleges of various streams. Dr. Narendra Kadu, the Registrar of the university, mentioned that such collective visit of students was the unique and the first of its own kind in the history of the university. The students visited and noted the information of every subject department, examination section, library, different meeting halls, Vice Chancellor's office, Registrar office and the entire campus of the university. The students would long cherish the unforgettable moments.

• Pledge of Simple Marriage:

We read or hear the news about the suicides of farmers. There are many reasons accountable for the death of farmers. One of the major reasons is bankruptcy. Why does farmer borrow loans? There are many reasons - because of the unproductiveness of land and because of uncertain rains and because of no guarantee of yield. The farmer

wishes to marry off daughters at the best suitable family and the conformities of society demand dowry. Moreover, the rich wish to marry in all affluence. Some hire D.J. and some expensive bands. The poor ape them blindfoldedly by borrowing loans. Dance Bands, felicitations and affluence in marriages set the farmers in never ending vicious cycle of debts. The farmer is born in debts, grows in debts and dies under the burden of death. To avoid this, *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* organized the event of Pledge of Simple Marriages on 11/05/2013 the eve of birthday of Hon'ble Yashwantraoji Gadakh under the presidency of the then Vidhansabha Speaker, Diliprao Walse Patil. Thousands of younger boys and girls of the college and the society at large took the pledge to marry in simple manner without bereaving the family of its happiness.

• Adopted Village Morye Chinchore:

Often we dream that the rich, the businessmen, the film stars or the cricketers must adopt a village and develop comprehensively. However, the same does not come true. Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan considered the issue and brought it into practice. Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan adopted a village Morye Chinchore on Sonai – Vambhori road, the village which was notorious at one time for quarrels and was deprived of govt. facilities and finance. But today through the activities like plantation, free library, free hospital, financial assistance for surgery, all diseases diagnosis camp and free medicines, villagers feel the village has acquired its status. Consequently, the Govt. took cognizance of the same and implemented different schemes like tar roads, plantations of 1 lac trees, wild Vanrai bands and watershed development. With the aegis of SPP University, Pune, Arts, Commerce and Science College, Sonai arranged winter camp for two consecutive years and accomplished varied types of work. Today people are living in the village contently.

• Krutdnyata Award (Gratitude Award):

We owe a lot to society, inspired out of this noble zeal, *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan* resolved to confer the *Krutdnyata* Award to pay back for the deeds, on those who achieved excellence in diverse fields as philosophers, scientists and humanitarians and served the nation. Ultramodern technologies should be applied for the development of the common people. The young generation must nurture the unconquerable optimism to dream for the development of the country. Owning these feelings, Dr. Raghunath Mashelkar; scientist of world repute, Nasima Hurjuk; social activist, Gulzar; senior poet-director (27/01/2013), Anil Kakodkar; nuclear scientist, Babasaheb Purandare; a noted historian, Dr. Prakash and Mandakini Amate; social activists (24/01/2014), Dr.Tatyaraoji Lahane (Optician, Mumbai), Dr. Sadanand

More (Author, Pune), Shri. Nagrajaji Manjule (Film Director, Pune) (24/01/2016) were bestowed with the award. The Pratishtan is always at the front to avail to the youths the thoughts of the dignitaries who achieved heroic deeds and thereby shaping the future directions of the youths through the inspiration of the thoughts. The faculty members of the college and the students involve in different kinds of arrangement works of the programme like distributing invitation cards, seating arrangements, etc.

• Anand Pilgrimage:

One who owns money can go anywhere he desires. He dreams it and can bring it into practice. However, the poor youths from the rural area does not have any idea of desired destination, the nature and the tour. Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan organized Anand Pilgrimage with 800 youths from Newasa taluka through the Zelum Express to 'Vaishnav Devi' a place of worship to all religions and the farthest end of India. It became a matter of admiration that all pilgrims lived with integrity and secularism. The pilgrims have learnt the lesson that the nature brings human beings together and tourism teaches man how to live in adverse conditions. The rugged Marathi man hoists the flag to the end. Unity is strength. The pilgrimage enlivened the atmosphere in Newasa taluka and since then 'Jai Mata di' has become an expression of daily greeting for everyone.

• Girls' Adoption for Educational Parentage :

Ahmednagar District's share in the cooperative movement is large one. There is a great web of the cooperative institutes like cooperative factories, cooperative water distribution societies, cooperative societies, etc. Girls from the common families are deprived of education due to economical and social reasons. The Pratishtan in collaboration with the college attempted to locate such girls from the villages in the vicinity who have strong urge for learning and adopted 52 girls for completing their education. At present, the girls are learning with self-respect and content and being the part of the bright future of the country. The expenditure on education of such girls is borne by the Pratishthan. Such provision is availed to 5 girl students of the college.

• Avishkar Research Competitions:

Over years, there has been active participation of students in the *Avishkar*. The RCC encourages the participation of students by organizing interactive sessions with experts and providing teacher mentors.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format, which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional objectives and/or contributed to the quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

Best Practice I:

ORGANISATION OF WORKSHOPS FOR TEACHERS AND ADMINS OF THE SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES IN THE VICINITY

• Goal:

To foster current competencies in the employees

To revive learning spirit in the participants

To strengthen the subject knowledge through the interaction

To bridge the gap of communication among the teachers of the same subject at different stages

• The Context:

Usually education of student is moderately divided into three stages viz. 1 std. to 10th std. (primary/secondary education), 11 std. to 12 std. (higher secondary education) and 12std. onwards higher education. A few subjects like English, Marathi, Science, etc. are taught at all the three levels. However, it has been observed that one of the reasons of failure in these subjects is due to gap of communication among the teachers who taught at these different levels. Workshops are arranged by the Govt. or regulatory bodies for the teachers at these stages separately, where the teachers of the three stages cannot exchange their ideas under one roof. Primary teachers cannot exchange their problems/ ideas with secondary teachers and similarly higher secondary teachers cannot do so with teachers in higher education. Due to this gap of communication, students suffer. The basics of the subject remain poor.

It was also observed that many best practices related to office administration and office work in other institutes remain ignored due to lack of exchange of ideas.

• The Practice:

The meetings of the departments were convened to discuss and earmark difficult topics in the subject. The report of the meeting was submitted to the Principal of the college for the approval for arranging the workshops. Timetable and the schedule were chalked out by taking into consideration other programmes of the college. The invitation cards and request letters to the heads of other schools and colleges were sent. The information of the participant teachers and admin members was collected well in advance.

The following workshops were arranged:

- A Two Day Workshop on 'English Grammar and Pronunciation for Primary and Secondary Teachers' was organized during 11-12 Jan. 2016. Prof. S.S. Gadkarai, Vice Principal, Rahuri college, Prin. Manisha Sathe, MPS, Sonai, Prof. Hemant Sharma, Coordinator, MES, Prin. Dr. V.K. Deshmukh, CEO, MES were the Chief Guests and Resource Persons. Total 50 Teachers of Different Schools Participated in the Workshop.
- 2. A Two Day Workshop on 'Vyakaran V Vyavharik Upyojit Marathi' (Grammar and Applied Marathi) was organised during 15 16 Feb. 2016 for the secondary teachers of the schools of Mula Education Society, Sonai.
- 3. Workshop on 'Empowerment of office' for teaching and non-teaching staff was organised by IQAC on 18 Mar. 2016. Dr. S.K. Zinzurde, New Arts, Com. And Science College, Ahmednagar, Mr. Shivajirao Sable, Senate member, SPPU, Pune and Prin. Dr. G.B.Kalhapure guided the participants. 45 members participated and actively interacted with the experts.

Evidence of Success: The success of the practice is evidenced by:

- Appreciation of the events by the participants.
- Around 150 participants from different schools/ institutes attended the workshop
- The feedback underlines the importance of workshop.
- Computer based activities is appreciated by the participants.
- The improvement in computer related skills of teachers.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Participants yet have to get acquainted with the culture of workshop. The heads of other schools and institutes were reluctant to send teachers to attend the workshop due to their busy schedule.

Yet the college requires a well-equipped auditorium to arrange the workshop. Due to load shedding, power cut of electricity some time creates problems, so full back up of Electricity Invertors are required.

Best Practice II: STUDENT AND FACULTY EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

• Goal:

- To expand students' knowledge base and competencies in the interdisciplinary subjects
- To develop a global perspective and approach to education
- To facilitate the faculty to initiate interdisciplinary research

• The Context:

The college is fortunate to share the topics and the units of syllabus with Agriculture College, Sonai and College of Education, Sonai especially with respect to subjects like Botany, Mathematics, Chemistry, English, History and Geography. Other three colleges offer professional courses and the host college offers traditional courses. Apart from the differences in the mode of teaching and credits given to the topics and the units, the basics of the syllabus are the same. There is a major difference between the students of professional colleges and the students of the host college. Whereas, the students of professional colleges come from urban area and reside in the hostels in the college campus, the students of the host college come from rural area and are day scholars. This offers the students opportunities to interact with the students of different academic culture.

• The Practice:

Student and Faculty Exchange Programme were organized during 5th to 17th January 2015. The college formed MoU's with Agriculture College, Sonai and college of Education, Sonai. Meetings were held to earmark the units and the topics from the university syllabus. However, the common topics were selected for teaching. The timetable was also formed to that effect. This helped the teachers to continue the topics without disturbing the teaching plan of the subject. The care was also taken to exchange textbooks and reference books in advance to prepare the lectures and presentations.

The idea was new for the faculty members and the students as well. So in the inauguration programme the guest faculty members and the topics were introduced well in advance. The exchanged students were felicitated.

The idea of exchanged faculty members and students so stirred the whole

teaching ambience of the college that students started attending the classes seriously and participated in the teaching activity whole heartedly and raised questions and queries during the class.

Total 8 teachers of host college, 3 teachers of College of Agriculture, Sonai and 04 teachers of College of Education, Sonai participated in the faculty exchange programme and taught at the exchanged college. The students of the colleges were also exchanged.

- Evidence of Success: The success of the practice is evidenced by:
 - Appreciation of the events by community, NGOs and the local representatives of news media
 - The change in the attitude of students and the faculty
 - More participation of students in the Avishkar Research Project Competition
 - Feedback collected from students marked the usefulness of the programme
 - The use of ICT for the lecture presentations

• Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- The concept was new and it was introduced for the first time in the colleges.
- Initially students were reluctant to participate in the discussions in the classrooms.
- Students and faculty exchange programme might have been transferred into a regular activity which did not happen.
- Collaborative research activity did not develop.

POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The second cycle of accreditation of Arts, Commerce and Science College, Sonai was carried out in September 2011. The peer team made observations and recommended measures for quality sustenance and enhancement. Keeping in view, the recommendation and the peer team report, the college has launched new academic programmes, new sports game, purchased new equipments, arranged new research activities and teachers obtained Ph. D. degrees in the new areas of research.

Above and beyond, the college has introduced many best practices in all the dimensions of higher education:

Fostering Teaching-Learning Process:

The teachers have made consistent efforts to enrich the curriculum either by their contribution in restructuring of the university syllabi or by developing new syllabus for the certificate courses. As chairman and member of BOS, two faculty members of the college have played the leading role in restructuring under graduate and postgraduate curricula for Commerce and English subjects of Savitribai Phule Pune University. Number of other faculties participated in different workshops of syllabus framing and gave suggestions. Syllabus of the Post graduate courses as Chemistry, English, History and Hindi are based on credit system. The English department has the Language lab. UGC and university approved the credit system The IQA Cell and faculty members of chemistry department jointly developed and designed a one month job-oriented certificate course in Soil and Water Analysis. The Department of Botany designed and developed a yearly need-based Certificate in Medicinal and Aromatic Plant, funded by UGC for science stream students. The college through feedback committee periodically takes the feedback of the students and staff on the present syllabus.

The college bridged the gap between students through the Remedial Coaching. To enrich the knowledge of the students, the college has organized guest lectures, students' seminars, projects, and special permission for the advanced and final year degree students to have open access into the stack and periodical sections of the library. The personal counseling has given to the students. The COCs conducted in the college also has helped to enrich the students' knowledge.

The advanced learners are identified during the induction programme on the basis of their previous academic performance. The students who excel in the academic performance during the continuous evaluation process are also identified as the advanced learners. The advanced learners are provided with guidance to realize their full potentials. They are provided with extra reading materials. They are guided to read original books, primary woks, reference material and search internet for advanced material. Advanced learners are asked to prepare additional seminar papers on topics of their choice. They are

motivated to conduct and anchor the academic programmes organized in and outside the college. Keeping in view the recommendations of the peer team, the college has started the competitive centre in collaboration with Yashwant Study Club for guiding rural students for UPSC and MPSC examinations.

The college has purchased 8 LCD projectors to enable the teachers to engage large classes. The students are nurtured by availing them the ICT based classrooms.

Enriching the Research Culture

The college is humbly proud to consist 21 Ph.D. faculty members in its staff, the number that is higher to any other educational institution at the taluka places in Ahmednagar district and the number is double to the number at the second cycle of accreditation of the college. The research culture has been so imbibed in the college that the students' participation has been considerably grown in research activities like 'Avishkar'. Over the last five years, 58 students belonging to all faculties have participated at zonal and university level research competition. Total 8 teachers have involved in active research guiding 13 students for Ph.D. 22 national or state level conferences/ seminars have been organized in the post accreditation period. The interdisciplinary research is also the emerging area in most of the departments. Total 24 minor research projects and 2 major research projects have been carried out. More than 278 research papers have been published in the reputed journals and have been presented in different national and international seminars. Total 16 teachers of the college have presented their research papers overseas.

Enhancing the Institutional Social Responsibility

The social outreach programmes in collaboration with *Yashwant Samajik Pratishtan, Sonai* is an initiative started to enable the students and the faculty members to pay back for the community around, amidst of which the college is located. Report on the Institutional Accreditation of the Mula Education Society's Arts, Commerce and Science College, Sonai – 414 105, Taluk - Newasa, District - Ahmednagar, Maharashtra

Section 1: Introduction

Mula Educational Society, Sonai established, Arts, Commerce & Science College, Sonai at District Ahmednagar in June 1989. The College is affiliated to University of Pune, Pune and is a Grant-in-Aid College.

Mula Educational Society was registered in 1979. The aim of this society is to impart education to the people belonging to all castes, creeds and communities irrespective of their sex and to make educational facilities available in rural areas and to promote the education among the rural masses in the adjoining areas.

The college campus area is 20 acres and is located in rural area. The college was started in rural area because the students had to go to Newasa (40Kms), Rahuri (25Kms.), and Ahmednagar (45Kms.) for higher education. Most of them were from agricultural background and socially and economically backward. Their parents could not afford the higher education though they were willing to educate them and they have to spend nearly Rs.10,000/- per student per year for the education.

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Most of the students admitted in the college are below average level. In addition they are repeater more than twice at (12th) twelfth standard. The strength of such students during last five years is on an average 12.28%. Generally, they are not admitted in urban college since admission is on merit basis. So they are also admitted in this college and thereby an opportunity is given to them to take higher education. 29.02% girls have taken the benefit of higher education during the last five years.

The college prepared the self study report and submitted to the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore. NAAC constituted a peer team comprising of Prof. P. S. Bisen (Formerly VC, Jiwaji University), presently working as Director, Madhav Institute of Technology and Science, Gwalior, Madhya Pradesh as Chairman, Prof. Susila Mariappan, Director, University Students Advisory Bureau (USAB), University of Madras, Chennai, Tamil Nadu and Prof. George Thomas, Principal, Christ College, Rajkot, Gujarat as members. Mr. B. S. Pommudiraj, Academic Professional of NAAC ably coordinated the peer team visit.

Before arriving in the college the peer team studied and analysed the self study report submitted by the college. The peer team visited the college during $27^{th} - 29^{th}$ Jan 2003 to validate the self-study report and see the physical and infrastructural facilities available in the campus. The team also interacted with the management committee, the secretary, the principal, members of the faculty, administrative staff, technical staff, students alumni and parents of the students and verified all documentary evidences. The following is the evaluation report of the peer team.

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Section 2: Criterion-wise Analysis

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The college is conducting the following programs.

- 1. B.A.:- English as compulsory subject and any five out of seven available subjects, i.e., Marathi, Hindi, Geography, History, Economics, Politics, and Additional English.
- 2. B.Com.:- Along with the core subjects Accountancy, Business Economics (Micro), English, Marathi. Students have the option to select the subject of their choice from the following groups.

Group (A):- Marketing, Salesmanship & Publicity, Banking and Finance, Secretarial Practice and Company Management.

Group (B):- Cost and work Accountancy, Business law, Taxation and Auditing, Business entrepreneurship, Purchasing and store keeping.

B.Sc.:- Following group options available.

Group (A):

- 2. Physics
- 3. Chemistry
- 4. Botany

Group (B): Students are offered to take either of the following subgroups.

Group (I)

University of Pune. Pune, circulates the curriculum of the above programs for the purpose of teaching and evaluation. Thus the college has no power and jurisdiction to bring any change in the curriculum with a view to restructure. No doubt they "The University of Pune, Pune." Act provided the scope of autonomy to the college but this college has yet not availed this scheme. It was, however, seen that two of the teachers of this college are members of the board of studies of the university and they are involved in restructuring the curriculum.

It takes a year to start a new course within the present university system. Industry - neighborhood network does not exist.

The college has not obtained any feedback from academic peers and employers with reference to teaching-learning in undergraduate and postgraduate programmes.

The college conducted seminars to frame the syllabus for the certificate course in e-Commerce.

Along with above undergraduate programs the college is conducting a Certificate Course in Beauty Techniques for girls in collaboration with Vocational Education and Training, Government of Maharashtra.

The peer team felt that the goals and the objectives of the institutionviz. providing low cost higher education to the rural backward children of the region were more or less achieved

Criterion II: Teaching-Learing and Evaluation

The college runs in three shifts from morning 0800 hrs to 1300 hrs for Arts, 1205 hrs to 1630 hrs for Science and 1000 hrs to 1400 hrs for Commerce.

Most of the students are average and some are below average level. The number of students who are admitted is less than the admission quota allotted to the college by the university. The teachers on their own level tried to help the students regarding their admission and motivated them to take higher education.

The college conducts class tests and terminal examinations in order to evaluate the student performance during the course of the academic year, even though these tests marks are not counted for the award of the university degree, the students seems to take it seriously. Teachers correct the answer books and return them to the students with necessary feedback. The college needs to provide bridge and / or remedial courses in multi-disciplines to the educationally disadvantaged students.

In the beginning of the academic year, the staff meeting is held to distribute the subjects to the teachers. At the departmental level the teachers can share the courses and topics to be taught in the year.

Out of the 29 teaching staff only 18 members are eligible to do university evaluations and only three are eligible to set question papers for university examinations.

The college follows the lecture method of teaching in most of the classes. Teachers may be encouraged to use novel teaching methodologies like Charts, OHP, Computer Multi media projectors, seminars, group discussions, etc. to make the teaching-learning process effective, informative and meaningful. Though college has a few CD's and audio-video cassettes for teaching-learning but rarely used. The Botany, Zoology and Geography departments conduct study tours.

The college conducts various co-curricular and extra curricular activities through literary, arts, commerce and science associations, women cell, NSS and NCC.

The procedure laid down by the State Govt, and University of Pune are followed for the recruitment of teachers in the vacant posts. The committee finds procedure hurdles and delays thereof in the recruitment of the teachers. Under the principal and management authority the college has freedom to appoint and pay temporary / adhoc teaching staff in certain circumstances. Even though the current teaching staff members are committed and motivated the peer team suggests that the number of teaching staff members available are quite inadequate to meet the academic demands.

Though the teaching staff members have attended orientation and refresher courses organised by different Academic Staff Colleges, which is the basic requirements, they have not been exposed to the recent trends in their subjects by attending conferences, seminars, symposia, etc. at state and national levels.

There are two faculty members who received state / university teaching awards. There are no national and international level linkages for teaching and research.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college runs two postgraduate programmes viz., M.A. in Hindi and M.A. in English. There is no project work for the postgraduate students. There are 29 full time teaching staff drawing UGC scales from the government of Maharashtra. Out of 29 there are 2 teachers with Ph.D. and 7 with M.Phil, degrees.

During the last five years there is no publication from any faculty. The team suggests that the college should take immediate steps towards promoting research culture among teachers and postgraduate students. Teachers may be encouraged to register for Ph. D. degree in their respective subject. The college may try to attract funding from academic bodies for research and development by submitting project proposal through research committee.

The college doesnot provide any consultancy services.

The college conducts various community oriented extension activities through NSS and NCC. The extension activities are blood donation camps, medical camps, plantation, AIDS and environment awareness, Adult Education and literacy camps in the nearby villages.

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Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is situated in an area of 20 acres of land. The campus is well planted in a pollution free atmosphere. Acute shortage of classrooms exist in the college. Only 6 classrooms are available in the college and needs greater attention by authorities. There should be proper provision of electricity connection, illumination, fans, furniture and ventilation in the classroom. The peer team suggests that the management should strengthen the classrooms.

Only one laboratory has been provided in science subjects each in Physics Chemistry, Botany and Zoology. The students in Chemistry department has to perform practicals in physical chemistry, analytical chemistry, organic chemistry and inorganic chemistry in a single laboratory, which is highly insufficient. The team suggests that there has to be minimum two laboratories for the chemistry practicals. Similarly in the physics department there is only one laboratory for conducting practicals in physical sciences along with computers. The peer team advises to segregate the computer laboratory separately from the physics department.

In the laboratory of Botany and Zoology departments, the microscopes used by the students are of very primitive in nature. They should be replaced with latest microscopes of 1000x magnifications. The instruments required to demonstrate practicals to the students at the undergraduate level are not available in the departments of Botany and Zoology. The team advises that the college should update the laboratories with new equipments as per the present day requirements in life sciences.

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The library is backbone of any institution, which we notice, is in very poor shape. The number of books in the library is nearly 8000, 47 periodicals and magazines and 4 journals. The library is being arranged in a classroom of nearly 400 sq.ft. area which is too meager to accommodate the books and the students together. Therefore, the management should think of constructing a complete library with proper infrastructure facilities. Girl's students face problems in access to the library. It is good to see that all books are catalogued through computer. The investment on the library is too low. The team suggests that it should be enhanced three to four folds from the present level. The reprographic facility is not available in the entire campus. For the benefit of the students it will be highly appreciable if the college obtain a photocopy machine for the library. The working hours of the library should also be extended.

The peer team appreciates the efforts made by the college management for computer literacy programme in the college by arranging computer courses within the campus for the office and college staff. The students are showing interest in learning computer programmes. Looking to the interest of students the computer peripherals should be updated. There are 14 computers in the campus. One with the Principal and another with the Office of the Principal. Twelve are kept in the Physics department laboratory with internet connectivity for students and staff.

It is surprising to note that the college with strength of 700 students, 28 teaching staff and nearly 65 non-teaching employees has got no health care centre. The team advises to initiate the establishment of health services in the campus in order to meet the contingencies.

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There is a Physical Education Director without any supporting staff. There are two volleyball courts, one kho-kho court, and one badminton court. There is hardly any sports kit in the college. There are only 6 badminton rackets, 6 hockey sticks and one volleyball. The sports department requires to pay high attention in the maintenance of courts and available sports kits. The students of this college have high potential in sports if properly groomed. The college is collecting nearly Rs 36,000/- per annum as sports fees. The team advises to utilize the sports fees for sports activity. It is heartening to note that one student was selected for inter-university competition from this college.

Women's wing of NCC are doing very well. The cadets are highly motivated and one cadet has passed B Certificate in a short span of two years of its establishment in the campus. There is a demand from the boys students to start NCC boys wing so that they can also be benefited with NCC training and that will also open the job opportunities for the students in Indian Army.

A working women hostel has been built by the finances from Ministry of Social Welfare, Government of India in the premises of the college with a capacity of 20 girls inmates. The college is maintaining the hostel by appointing one lady teacher as warden. Out of five students staying the hostel only one is from the college and the other four from the nearby schools. The hostel is under utilized.

There is no boys hostel, canteen and guest house available in the campus.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The drop out rate is very high (around 50%) as most of the students either migrate to other colleges for the want of desired subjects or due to inadequate teaching staff members in the department

The pass percentage of the students in the last two batches for Science, Arts and Commerce is not encouraging and they are around 40%, 55% and 60% respectively

Two students have passed State Level Educational Test (SLET)

The college publishes its updated prospectus annually

Financial aids are made available to the students of Backward Class (BC), Scheduled Caste (SC) and Nomadic Tribes (NT) from the state government.

The college encourages the outstanding students by providing cash awards.

The peer team suggests that the college may initiate a career and placement cell. However, the college has compensated this to a certain extent by providing students sufficient guidelines and information about employment potentials through the informal guidance given by the teaching staff members.

Informal academic and personal counseling is provided by teachers even though there is no exclusive cell for academic and personal counselling.

The college has a website for further communication to alumni. The college gives due importance to the alumni and they in turn actively participate in the college developmental activities. The alumni of this college hold the prominent positions as secondary school teachers, police constables, defence personnel, lecturers, etc.

Criterion VI: Organisation and Management

As per the rules and regulations of the University of Pune, there is a local managing committee with representatives of teachers (3) and non-teaching staff (1). The teacher representatives are also participating in decision-making.

The peer team notices that there is inadequacy in the number of the teaching staff and most of the staff members are overloaded. The college lacks adequate mechanism to invite visiting faculty to share the responsibilities of the academic staff. The team understands that in many of the science departments students prefer to change the college for the third year course, reason being inadequacy in the number of teaching staff.

There is a fax machine and internet connectivity for the staff and students in the physics laboratory.

Annual formal performance appraisal system is adopted

Almost 50% of the teaching staff has completed certificate courses and computer literacy. Non-teaching staff members are also given computer exposure.

There is a separate committee for the preparation of academic calendar.

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Self Study Report: NAAC - 3rd Cycle

The annual budget allocated to the different departments is inadequate. The college has succeeded in mobilising resources through various schemes involving students, staff and alumni and also by conducting short term course - Beauty Care, Computer related Courses, etc.

Criterion VII: Healthy Practices

The college has played a positive role in creating awareness about value of girls education in this rural and backward area. In its existence of 13 years the college has inculcated many traditional values to the students. The peer team is pleased to note the following healthy practices in the college.

- Student's talents are tapped through various associations debate, commerce, science, arts, and literary.
- Periodical parents meetings are organised to apprise the parents about their wards academic performance.
- The campus is highly disciplined.
- The campus is kept beautiful with greenery and clean.
- The college displayed a good team work and a sense of belongingness.
- Internet facility is made available to the staff and students free of cost
- Partial computerization of library and office.

Section 3: Overall Analysis

MULA education society's Arts, Commerce and Science College, Sonai is a Grant-in-Aid institution affiliated to University of Pune, Pune. In the last 13 years of Existence it has helped to spread the Higher Education among all classes in the Newasa tehsil. During the visit in the campus, the Peer Team could identify certain good practices and features in the

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functioning of the college that which have been already mentioned in the section 2, criterion-wise analysis.

The authorities seem to be fully aware of their responsibilities and the peer team is pleased to make the following recommendations for the further improvement of the college.

- More encouragement may be given to the teaching staff to attend seminars, conferences, symposia at the state / national levels.
- Concerted efforts may be initiated by the teaching staff to widen the activities and thereby to enhance the image of the departments.
- Staff members may be encouraged to pursue research degrees namely M.Phil. and Ph.D. to meet the challenges of the changing society.
- Coaching programmes may be initiated to train the students in the competitive examinations in the state and national levels.
- Experienced visiting faculty members may be invited to the college to fill in the vacuum created due to the delay in the appointments of full time faculty members.
- Job oriented agro based courses may be introduced in consultation with the agricultural university.
- Staff members may be trained in novel teaching methodologies to make teaching learning process effective, informative and interesting.
- Students may be encouraged to organise seminars in the intra as well as inter college levels, which in turn can develop their leadership, communication and organisational skills.
- The English proficiency of the students may be enhanced through concerted and planned approach – classes by experts proficient in English - Elocution, Debate competitions, etc.
- A proper feedback mechanism is highly recommended.



- > Full time appointment of sufficient number of staff would improve the quality and excellence in academics.
- More faculty development programmes would lead to quality consciousness among the staff.
- Essential facilities like Hostel, Canteen, and Medical assistance may be provided to the students.

The Peer Team expresses its sincere thanks to the Principal, his faculty colleagues, the management and the students of the college for the courtesy extended to them during their stay in the campus.
